ADVANCE EXHIBITION SCHEDULE

The National Gallery of Art will hold several special exhibitions in the next six months including: The Far North: 2000 Years of American Eskimo and Indian Art, devoted to the art of the Eskimos, Aleuts, Athabaskans and Tlingit (March 8 through May 15); American Impressionist Painting, to be installed on the Main Floor in galleries near those of the French Impressionists pictures in the permanent collection (May 12 through August 12); and Italian Fifteenth-Century Engravings, also to be on view through the summer, comprising a major show of early Italian prints from the Rosenwald Collection, with important loans from museums in the United States and Europe.

STUDIES IN THE HISTORY OF ART

The first independent Studies in the History of Art, which was formerly incorporated with the Gallery's Annual Report, is now available. Of primary interest is an article by the late Rudolf Wittkower, who was the Gallery's 1970 Kress Professor in Residence, on a Desiderio marble in the Gallery's collection, St. Jerome in the Desert. Also included are articles by John Rewald, Madeleine Hours, Wolfgang Stechow, Fern Rusk Shapley, David W. Scott, and Bernard Keisch. The Studies will continue as an annual publication.

MEZZOTINT EXHIBITION EXTENDED

Continuing on view in the print exhibition gallery (G-19) is: Mezzotint: A Survey of the Technique 1642-1962. The technique of mezzotint was first developed during the 17th century and flourished through the 18th. In recent years there has been a revival of interest in mezzotint among printmakers and collectors. Forty prints dating from the 17th through the 20th centuries have been chosen primarily from the National Gallery's Rosenwald Collection. An explanatory display of tools used—roulette, scraper, burnisher, and rocker—is also included in the exhibition. On view through February.
