IMPRESSIONIST AND POST-IMPRESSIONIST PAINTINGS FROM THE U.S.S.R.

The first loan to the United States of Western paintings from Soviet museums, forty-one pictures from the Hermitage in Leningrad and the Pushkin Museum in Moscow will be on view at the National Gallery of Art in galleries 68 through 71 on the main floor. Entitled Impressionist and Post-impressionist Paintings from the U.S.S.R., the exhibition will open to the public on April 1 and will remain on view in Washington through April 29. The pictures will be shown at M. Knoedler & Co., New York City, from May 3 through May 26. A grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities, under a new program of aid to museum exhibitions, will partially support the exhibition and related educational materials at the National Gallery. Negotiations for the loan to the United States were effected by Dr. Armand Hammer of Los Angeles, California. The loan includes seven paintings each by Matisse and Gauguin, six by Picasso, five by Cézanne, three by van Gogh, two each by Monet, Rousseau, Renoir, and Derain, and important single works by Pissarro, Sisley, Braque, Vlaminck and Léger.

The exhibition is accompanied by a catalog containing full-color illustrations of each painting. On several evenings during April, prominent scholars will give a special series of free lectures pertaining to the paintings in the exhibition. (Additional information concerning the lectures will be mailed.) Free guides to the exhibition, prepared by the staff and funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities grant, will be available at the entrance to the exhibition. The extended summer hours beginning April 1 will allow ample time to view the paintings.

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THE FAR NORTH CONTINUES

The Gallery's special loan exhibition, *The Far North:* 2000 Years of American Eskimo and Indian Art, continues through May 15. Three hundred sixty-five works have been brought together in an unusual display of the indigenous art of the Alaskan region from prehistoric times to the end of the 19th century.

Among educational activities related to the exhibition are three special Saturday morning programs designed for young people of grade school age. After half-hour film showings in the auditorium, guides will be waiting in the Constitution Avenue Lobby to take children through the exhibition. Films of Indian and Eskimo peoples, their arts and crafts, and their ancient legends, contributing significantly to an understanding of the early cultures, are being shown regularly in the auditorium. Also available, at the exhibition, is an Acoustiguide tour written by members of the Education Department. The last in the Tour of the Week series, begun in March, will be given from April 3 through 8.

DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR GIVES 1973 MELLON LECTURES IN THE FINE ARTS

Jacques Barzun, a leading cultural historian of the modern period, will deliver the 22nd annual Andrew W. Mellon Lectures in the Fine Arts at the National Gallery. The title of his lecture series is *The Use and Abuse of Art*. Mr. Barzun serves as University Professor at Columbia University, the highest honor accorded by the University. The Mellon Lectures are supported by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation.

ETCHINGS BY REMBRANDT

An exhibition of approximately 75 prints by Rembrandt belonging to the National Gallery has been organized with the intention of showing the finest impressions in the collection. It will also demonstrate how the artist worked on his plates, often changing them as he proceeded, and how the different inking and different papers he used for printing certain subjects altered the appearance of each impression. The exhibition is complemented by the loan of four original copper plates from the collection of Mrs. Robert Lee Humber. On view in the print exhibition galleries (G-12 and G-19) April 17 through July.

30th AMERICAN MUSIC FESTIVAL

The National Gallery's 30th American Music Festival, made possible with funds bequeathed by F. Lammot Belin, will be held on Sunday evenings between April 15 and May 27. Orchestral, chamber, piano, and choral music will be featured. The final program will feature the National Gallery Orchestra, Richard Bales, Conductor. Several world premieres of works composed especially for the festival will highlight the series.
