DRAWINGS BY FRANÇOIS BOUCHER

The first major loan exhibition in North America devoted to drawings by François Boucher, the reigning artist of mid-eighteenth-century France, opens Sunday, December 23 at the National Gallery. Portraits, landscapes, genre scenes, pastorals, nudes, children and animals, mythologies and religious compositions, designs for tapestries, fountains and clocks, architectural decorations and book illustrations are among the one hundred drawings representing Boucher's repertoire from private and public collections in the United States and Canada. Revealing Boucher's excellence as a draftsman, the drawings are characteristic observations by the artist, recorded with extraordinary attention to detail. He also invested his work with a quality of make-believe, creating a fanciful, and for Boucher a more satisfying, world than actuality. In sketching landscapes, for example, he sometimes added imaginary towers, stone bridges, and marble fountains, lending an air of enchantment and turning the scene into a stage setting in which a variety of figures, such as nymphs, gods and goddesses, shepherds and courtiers play.

The exhibition has been organized in conjunction with The Art Institute of Chicago. The selection of drawings was made by David Rust, National Gallery Curator of French Painting, and Harold Joachim, Curator of Drawings at The Art Institute of Chicago. A fully illustrated catalog accompanies the exhibition. Regina Slatkin, authority on Boucher, wrote entries on each drawing and the introductory essay; she was assisted by Mr. Rust who edited the catalog.

FILMS ON MODERN ART AND ARTISTS

During December, a series of films on some of the artists in the National Gallery's special exhibition of twentieth-century American painting and sculpture will be shown in the Gallery auditorium. (Check inside listing for details.) An Acoustiguide to the exhibition, a Tour of the Week to be given the last week in December, and a color portfolio of every work on view accompany the exhibition.

The selection of twenty-six large-scale paintings and sculpture by twenty-three artists was made from private collections across the country by the Gallery's staff. Ownership of one painting in the show—Jackson Pollock's *Blue Poles* (1953) recently passed to the Australian National Gallery, Canberra. The exhibition remains on view through January 6, 1974 in the Central Gallery.

NEW SHORT FILMS ON GALLERY PAINTINGS

On Sunday, December 23 five new films on paintings belonging to the National Gallery will be shown. In the seven-minute motion pictures, the camera moves over the pictures to reveal seldom-noticed details and provoke moods expressive of the artists and their times. The Gallery's Extension Service will begin circulating the short films in 1974. Produced by WETA for the Gallery, the films are being shown on the Eastern educational television network.

AMERICAN TEXTILES

Watercolor renderings of woven material, needlework, quilts, and costumes from the Index of American Design will go on view in December in the Cafeteria Corridor Gallery. Some of the textiles represented are hand-woven pieces and embroidery samples from the colonial period through the nineteenth-century. They were produced as a means of artistic expression as well as for utilization purposes. A collection of over 17,000 watercolors of crafts and folk arts in the United States dating before 1700 until about 1900, the Index of American Design is the result of a Federal art project started in the late 1930s to record objects of artistic and historic significance.

NATIONAL GALLERY CHRISTMAS CARDS

Christmas cards of works of art in the National Gallery are on sale in the Publications Rooms. Many new subjects have been chosen from the Gallery's collections. This year's U. S.
