

NEW CAFÉ/BUFFET AND PLAZA TO OPEN THIS SUMMER

This summer for the Bicentennial, the National Gallery will open the connecting link between the West and new East Buildings. This marks completion of the first stage of the Gallery's building project.

Paved in autumn-rose granite block, a new plaza connecting the two buildings on grade will be enlivened by a fountain and seven large translucent tetrahedrons, which will serve both as a visual focus for the plaza, and as skylights bringing natural light into the concourse level below. Under this plaza, there will be an all-weather route joining the two buildings as well as two levels of space to house service facilities for the operation of the Gallery. The total connecting link area below grade encompasses 176,000 square feet, of which nearly a quarter will be devoted to public use. The fountain jets on the plaza will produce a cascade of water that will come down a rough, diagonally slanting "chadar" or waterslide into a collecting pool below.

The public area of the underground concourse features a new Café/Buffet in addition to a museum sales shop and a lounge. The Café, reminiscent of sidewalk cafés in Europe, will look on the "chadar," and waitresses will serve espresso, wine, beer and light snacks. The Buffet will provide both a fast-food line and self-service, cafeteria-style servery areas, where food selections may be chosen from a number of independent counters so as to minimize waiting in long lines. The dining area will more than double the capacity of the present cafeteria, which has proven too small to meet the heavy visitor demand.

THE EYE OF THOMAS JEFFERSON

Based on the life of the third President of the United States, the visual arts of his day, and his own highly enthusiastic interest in them, the National Gallery's major Bicentennial exhibition *The Eye of Thomas Jefferson* will include over 550 paintings, sculpture, drawings and prints, books, decorative arts, architectural models, and horticultural material. Jefferson's commitment to the visual arts greatly influenced the cultural life of this nation. His contributions to architecture, the decorative arts, the planning of cities and landscape design will be visualized through his drawings, through models of buildings never constructed and through photographs of surviving buildings. The exhibition, the most complex ever mounted by the Gallery, will be on view June 5 through September 6.

AMERICAN MUSIC FESTIVAL

This year's American Music Festival, extended to twelve weeks in honor of the Bicentennial, continues through May 30 each Sunday at 7:00 p.m. in the East Garden Court. Devoted entirely to works of American composers from colonial times to the present, the programs will also feature world premieres and first Washington performances.

MELLON LECTURES CONTINUE

Peter von Blanckenhagen, a renowned authority in Greek and Roman art and archaeology and the Gallery's 1976 Andrew W. Mellon Lecturer in Fine Arts, continues his lecture series *Aspects of Classical Art*. Given in the Gallery Auditorium on Sundays at 4:00 p.m., Professor von Blanckenhagen's lectures during April are entitled "Legends and History," "Individual and Society," "Program of the Parthenon," and "Classical Art in Ancient Views."

ART HISTORY SYMPOSIUM

The Middle Atlantic Symposium in the History of Art will be held in the Gallery's Auditorium on Saturday, April 3. The sessions are open to the public and are held at 10:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Selected graduate students will present short papers on their original research with subjects ranging from Medieval sculpture to American art.
