





Berenson and the Connoisseurship of Italian Painting

Through May 13 Mezzanine level, East Building

This exhibition illustrates the history and methods of connoisseurship, as it relates to Italian painting, by focusing on Bernard Berenson (1865–1959), the leading expert in the field. His taste and expertise are reflected by the Italian paintings in the National Gallery. Some twenty of these works by such artists as Antonello da Messina, Giorgione, Domenico

Veneziano, Andrea del Castagno, and Raphael, are on view in the exhibition, complemented by more than 100 drawings, prints, photographs, letters, telegrams, and books, revealing Berenson's connoisseurship and his appreciation and understanding of Italian art. Traveling throughout Europe and the United States and working at Villa I Tatti, a scholarly institution he established near Florence, Berenson was able to clarify and attribute the work of major as well as minor

The exhibition explores the role Berenson played in the history of taste and collecting. By the early twentieth century, American millionaires were beginning to acquire Italian art. Berenson stimulated and guided the interest of such collectors as P. A. B. Widener, his son Joseph, and Samuel H. and Rush Kress. The exhibition thus demonstrates Berenson's considerable influence on the formation of the great collections that came to the National Gallery.

During February, the Tours of the Week will discuss the Italian paintings in the Gallery's collection, and, during the last week, the exhibition itself. (Check listing for details.)

Edvard Munch: Symbols and Images

Two hundred forty-five paintings, prints, drawings, watercolors, woodblocks, and Munch's illustrated book *The Tree of Knowledge* are on view in the most comprehensive exhibition ever held in the United States of the work of this turn-of-the-century Norwegian artist.

Munch Play: "Painted Words," a one-hour play based on Munch's diaries, notes, and letters, and accompanied by slides and classical guitar music, will be performed in the East Building Auditorium February 1 through 5, weekdays and Saturday at 2:00 p.m. and Sunday at 6:00 p.m. Four actors and actresses of Norway's "Ensemblet," a professional acting group, approach the artist from the point of view of his writings.

Sunday Lecture: Reinhold Heller, a contributor to the exhibition catalogue and professor of art history and Germanic languages at the University of Chicago, will deliver the February 4 lecture on Edvard Munch and the Art of His Times. (Check listing for details.)

Grandma Moses: Anna Mary Robertson Moses (1860-1961)

Grandma Moses is this century's best loved exponent of American naive art. This exhibition will include forty-three paintings from public and private collections in the United States and Europe and will be the first Washington museum showing of her work since 1949.

Representing all periods and themes of her life's work, the exhibition will range from one of her earliest paintings, The First Automobile (c. 1939), to Rainbow (1961), completed during the last year of her life. Through such examples as Catching the Thanksgiving Turkey, The McDonell Farm, and Hoosick Valley (from the Window), the exhibition will illustrate the variety of subjects depicted in her art. Included are renderings of farm chores, remembrances of celebrations, and such community events as quilting bees and county fairs, as well as the changing seasons of her native New York State and Virginia.

George Heard Hamilton, renowned scholar of nineteenth- and twentieth-century European and American art, and the Gallery's Samuel H. Kress Professor in Residence for 1978–1979, will deliver three lectures on the psychological interpretation of impressionism. His lecture series will discuss landscape painting from 1860 to 1920 and figural painting from 1870 to 1890.
