

The Art of the Pacific Islands

July 1 through October 14 Special Exhibition Galleries Concourse level, East Building

Focussing on the visual arts of Polynesia, Micronesia, Melanesia and New Guinea-Pacific island groups whose existence was not discovered by Europeans until the sixteenth century and whose cultures were untouched by European influence until their contact with Captain James Cook and the China traders of the eighteenth century, this is the first comprehensive exhibition in over a quarter of a century, as much new material has come to light. The installation will take the visitor on a voyage of the island groups from east to west, beginning in Hawaii. Over 400 of the finest works extant have been lent from collections around the world in a variety of media including wood, ivory, feather work,


bone and shell. They have been selected for their pristine relationship to the original cultures, demonstrating the anonymous artists' sculptural mastery combined with striking color, their use of simple but elegant abstract design, and their great variation of form.

Sunday Lecture and Films: On Sunday, July 1, Douglas Newton, Chairman of the Department of Primitive Art at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, and the principal curator of the exhibition, will speak on The Art of the Pacific Islands at 4 p.m. in the East Building Auditorium. During the weeks of July 2, 9, and 23, films on Pacific island cultures will be shown in the East Building Auditorium. (Check listing for dates and times.)

Mondrian: The Diamond Compositions

July 15 through September 16 Upper level, East Building

Sixteen works of art by Piet Mondrian (1872–1944), eight paintings and eight drawings from European and American collections, have been brought together to explore this important twentieth-century master's great formal and expressive invention: the diamond-shaped painting. Mondrian's diamond paintings are probably the most famous of his oeuvre, and have become one of the classic images of modern art. The accompanying catalogue brings to light much new material on these pictures.

Sunday Lecture and Film: On Sunday, July 15, E. A. Carmean, Jr., the Gallery's curator of twentieth-century art and organizer of the exhibition, will speak on Mondrian's diamond compositions at 4 p.m. in the East Building Auditorium. Beginning Tuesday, July 17, short films on Mondrian will be shown in the East Building Auditorium. (Check listing for details.)

Twentieth-Century Acquisitions and Lectures

Three paintings and three drawings by the Armenian artist Arshile Gorky (1904–1948), one of the seminal figures of twentieth-century art, have been acquired by the Gallery through the Ailsa Mellon Bruce Fund. They are on view on the upper level of the East Building. These acquisitions bring to the Gallery the most fully representative Gorky holdings in a public institution. The paintings are Portrait of the Artist and His Mother (1926–36), One Year the Milkweed (1944) and Organization (c. 1934–36). The three drawings include a preparatory study for the Gallery's portrait, Nighttime, Enigma, and Nostalgia (c. 1932–34) and Untitled (Squared

Study for The Plow and the Song) (1944-45). Also on view will be the large drawing of The Plow and the Song acquired by the Gallery in 1971 through the Avalon Fund.

The Gallery's summer Sunday lectures, beginning July 8, will be devoted to discussions of themes or series pursued by major twentieth-century artists in the Gallery's collection. The July lectures will discuss Picasso, Mondrian, Kandinsky and Matisse. Illustrated with slides, the lectures are given in the East Building Auditorium at 4 p.m. by members of the Gallery staff.

Stuart Portraits on View

Gallery 60B West Building

The only surviving set of portraits of the first five presidents by the renowned American portraitist Gilbert Stuart (1775–1828), recently acquired by the Gallery, are on view as the core of a new installation of the Gallery's eighteenth-century American paintings. Concentrating on facial characterizations, eliminating unnecessary accessories and employing neutral backgrounds and simple bust or half-length compositions, Stuart rendered each president with unusual individuality, warmth and

humanity. The portrait of George Washington was presented to the Gallery by Thomas Jefferson Coolidge IV, in memory of his great grandfather, Thomas Jefferson Coolidge, his grandfather Thomas Jefferson Coolidge II, and his father, Thomas Jefferson Coolidge III. Mr. Coolidge has designated the portrait of Thomas Jefferson as a promised gift. The portraits of James Monroe, John Adams, and James Madison have been purchased through the Ailsa Mellon Bruce Fund.

Cycladic Art: Ancient Sculpture and Ceramics of the Aegean from the N. P. Goulandris Collection

Through September 3 Ground floor, East Buliding

One hundred sixty-six objects from the private collection of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas P. Goulandris of Athens are on view. Produced on the Cyclades Islands in the Aegean in prehistoric times, between 3500 and 1500 B.C., the works include the famous white marble figurines, as well as pottery vases and other ceramic objects.
