



The Art of the Pacific Islands

Extended through February 17, 1980 Concourse level, East Building

Each of the intricately carved wooden figures, masks, ceremonial implements, necklaces and other ornaments, and bird-feather capes from Polynesia, Micronesia, Melanesia and New Guinea has been chosen for its outstanding visual quality and as a perfect example of its original island culture.

European Terra-cottas from the Arthur M. Sackler Collections



A selection of sixty terra-cotta sculptures from the collections of Arthur M. Sackler will go on view this month. These delicate works, created at different moments in the last six centuries, served a variety of functions. Some are preliminary models for sculptures in marble or bronze, others are replicas or reduced copies of finished works, and some of the exhibited pieces were probably modeled directly in their final form as independent creations. The demand among discriminating collectors for "cabinet pieces" in terra-cotta reached its zenith in Italy and France in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries, and the majority of the Sackler terra-cottas come from this period.

Mies van der Rohe: The Barcelona Pavilion

The Barcelona Pavilion by Mies van der Rohe is considered one of the most influential buildings of the twentieth century. Constructed as part of the German display at the 1929 International Exhibition held in Barcelona, it was disassembled after the exhibition and the parts were dispersed. With original drawings, photographs, furniture and a model, this exhibition, organized for the Gallery by The Museum of Modern Art, New York, recalls the Pavilion, one of the most striking monuments of the International Style pioneered by Mies, on its fiftieth anniversary.

Honoré Daumier (1808-1879)

Through November 25 Print and Drawing Galleries Ground floor, West Building

This exhibition includes one hundred prints, drawings and sculpture by Daumier. The exhibition also marks the centenary of the death of this artist, a renowned nineteenth-century French political and social satirist. The prints and sculpture, including eight portrait busts, are from the Gallery's Rosenwald Collection, distinguished for its early proofs of the artist's lithographic work, with notations by the censors or caption writers for publication in contemporary newspapers and journals. The thirteen drawings are being lent by public collections in America. The exhibition is dedicated to the memory of Lessing J. Rosenwald, a founding benefactor of the Gallery and former trustee who died in June.

Sculpture by Picasso and Miró

Seven polychrome sculptures by Joan Miró and six bronze sculptures by Pablo Picasso, on loan to the Gallery, have been installed in the stepped exhibition space of the East Building. The Miró sculptures, in painted bronze and executed between 1967 and 1969, have never before been seen as a group in this country. The Picasso sculptures, a series called The Bathers, were originally executed in wood and then cast in bronze in 1956.
