

This American painting exhibition focuses on the culminating phase of 19th-century Hudson River school painting called luminism, seen most clearly in the work of five artists-Fitz Hugh Lane, Martin Johnson Heade, Sanford Gifford, John F. Kensett and Frederic E. Church. Over 160 paintings, 49 drawings and watercolors, and 47 photographs from public and private American collections concentrate for the first time on the full scope of this movement in art history. Luminism reflects American attitudes toward nature and the national identity-manifestations of Jacksonian optimism and expansiveness, combined with the belief in the transcendent spiritual beauty of nature.

Tours and Films: During the last two weeks in March, the Tours of the Week will be devoted to American paintings in the Gallery's permanent collection. Films during the month will also be shown on two artists in the exhibition—George Caleb Bingham and Winslow Homer—and on American paintings. (Check listings for details.)

Eighty-three exceptionally fine examples of American furniture and decorative arts from the mid-17th to the early-19th centuries have been brought together to present the best of American design and craftsmanship during this country's first 200 years and to bring new information in the field to the public. The installation will present each object as a work of art in its own right, rather than as part of a period room ensemble.

Tours: During the first three weeks in March, Tours of the Week will be devoted to the exhibition and to furniture and decorative arts in paintings. (Check listings for details.)

# Italian Drawings 1780-1890

One hundred and two drawings by Italian artists working in the 19th century have been selected from American public and private collections, supplemented by important loans from Italian museums. The exhibition defines and illuminates the various artistic trends in Italy between 1780 and 1890, a period in Italian art history rarely before examined.

## Two Exhibitions Close March 2

Wonders of the Age: Masterpieces of Early Safavid Painting, 1501-1576, perhaps the greatest assemblage of 16th-century Persian painting seen in the last 400 years, is on view on the ground floor of the East Building.

Italian Drawings from The Art Institute of Chicago, 151 drawings representing major schools of Italian art from the 15th through the 18th centuries, is on view in the prints and drawings galleries on the ground floor of the West Building.

The 1980 Andrew W. Mellon Lectures in the Fine Arts, given this year by Peter Kidson, will continue Sunday afternoons at 4 p.m. through March 30 in the East Building Auditorium. Mr. Kidson, professor at the University of London's Courtauld Institute of Art, is speaking on Principles of Design in Ancient and Medieval Architecture.

Monasticism and the Arts, a symposium, will be held on Saturday, March 22 in the East Building Auditorium. Open to the public, it will be sponsored by St. Anselm's Abbey, Washington, and Yale University. During sessions beginning at 9:30 a.m. and 3 p.m., scholars will present papers on monasticism and medieval and Renaissance art. A pamphlet with a self guiding tour of the Gallery's paintings with appropriate subjects and iconography will be available.

Middle Atlantic Symposium in the History of Art will be held this year on Saturday, March 29 in the East Building Auditorium and is also open to the public. During sessions beginning at 10:30 a.m. and 2 p.m., graduate students will present short papers.
