Gallery Hours: Through Labor Day, September 1, the Gallery will be open 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Sunday hours remain the same throughout the year: 12 noon to 9 p.m.

The Gallery is located between 3rd and 7th Streets, Northwest, on Constitution Avenue. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway. Entrances to the West Building are on the Mall and on Constitution Avenue at 6th Street, which has a ramp for the handicapped. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street, off National Gallery Plaza. There is a ramp for the handicapped.



**Post-Impressionism: Cross-Currents in European** and American Painting, 1880-1906

As no other exhibition has attempted to do, this international loan show of 274 paintings places the four major French post-impressionists in the context of their contemporaries, not only in France but in eight other countries in Europe and the United States. The four principals are Paul Cézanne, Paul Gauguin, Vincent van Gogh and Georges Seurat.

This exhibition is presented in sections entitled (1) Beyond Impressionism; (2) Aspects of Salon Painting, The 1880s; (3) Great Masters of Post-Impressionism, 1880-1906; (4) Brittany, Tradition and Innovation, 1886-1901; (5) Great Britain and Ireland; (6) The United States, 1880-1906; (7) Belgium and Holland, 1881-1897; (8) Aspects of Salon Painting, The 1890s; (9) Young Independents and the Nabis, 1887-1899; (10) The Neo-Impressionists (Pointillists), 1883-1896; (11) Divisionism in Italy, 1892-1905; (12) Germany, Norway and Switzerland, 1883-1902; and (13) The Heritage of Post-Impressionism, 1899-1906.

A recorded tour of the exhibition, lasting approximately 45 minutes, is available at the entrance for a nominal fee.

Lectures: During July, the four Sunday lectures will cover some of the aspects of post-impressionism in the exhibition. The talks will be given by English scholars who contributed to the Royal Academy exhibition, from which the Gallery's show was developed.

### **Twentieth-Century Art from** the Busch-Reisinger Museum

Seventy-two 20th-century northern and central European paintings, drawings, watercolors and sculptures from Harvard University's Busch-Reisinger Museum are on view, exploring some of the developments that followed post-impressionism in schools thinly represented in the Gallery's permanent collection. Founded in 1903, the Busch-Reisinger has in its holdings a distinguished collection of German expressionist and Bauhaus works. These include paintings and sculptures by Paul Klee, Lyonel Feininger, Wassily Kandinsky, George Grosz, Ernst Barlach, Emil Nolde, Max Beckmann, Erich Heckel and Karl Schmidt-Rottluff and works by Bauhaus artists such as Josef Albers, Laszlo Moholy-Nagy, Naum Gabo, Willi Baumeister and Oskar Schlemmer.

Films: During July, films on various artists in the exhibition will be shown in the Gallery Auditorium. (Check listings for details.)

In Praise of America: **Masterworks of American Decorative Arts**  $(1650 \cdot 1830)$

This is the Gallery's first American decorative arts exhibition. Included are 83 exceptionally fine examples from the mid-17th to the early 19th centuries. The selection was made to present the best of American design and craftsmanship during this country's first 200 years and to bring new information in the field to the visitor. Each piece is installed as a work of art in its own right rather than as part of a period room ensemble and the exhibition includes desks and bookcases, chairs, sofas, chests, sideboards, mirrors, clocks and works in glass, silver, brass, copper and iron by craftsmen working both in cities and in rural regions.

Complementing the exhibition is a 10minute audio-visual program, covering connoisseurship in the American decorative arts in the last 50 years.
