

The Gallery is located between 3rd and 7th Streets, Northwest, on Constitution Avenue. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway. Entrances to the West Building are on the Mall, on Constitution Avenue at 6th Street, which has a ramp for the handicapped, and off 4th Street. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street off National Gallery Plaza and also has a ramp for the handicapped.

EXHIBITIONS

20th-Century Masters: The Thyssen-Bornemisza Collection

May 30-September 6, 1982 Upper level and Mezzanine East Building

This exhibition of 66 paintings by twentieth-century European and American masters is drawn from the renowned collection of Baron Thyssen-Bornemisza of Lugano, Switzerland. Pablo Picasso, Wassily Kandinsky, Fernand Léger, René Magritte, Edward Hopper, Georgia O'Keeffe, and Richard Estes are among the artists represented in sections devoted to expressionism, abstraction, the city and still life, the surrealist generation, the human figure, and American painting. Many examples are on public view for the first time in the United States.

Mauritshuis: Dutch Painting of the Golden Age from the Royal Picture Gallery, The Hague

Through October 31, 1982 Upper level East Building

Rembrandt van Rijn, Johannes Vermeer, Frans Hals, Jacob van Ruisdael, and Jan Steen are among the seventeenth-century Dutch masters whose paintings are on view. Coinciding with the 200th anniversary of Dutch-American diplomatic relations, the exhibition consists of 40 paintings on loan

Dutch Figure Drawings from the Seventeenth Century

Through June 13, 1982 Mezzanine East Building

The 116 drawings and watercolors by Rembrandt van Rijn and his contemporaries included in this exhibition demonstrate the widely diverse and sensitive portrayals of the human figure by Dutch draftsmen of the period. Fifteen works by Rembrandt, four by Willem Buytewech, three by Hendrick

Legacy: Andrew Mellon Remembered is a 58-minute historical and dramatic film about the Gallery's founder. The biography spans the Harding, Coolidge, Hoover, and Roosevelt administrations. The Gallery's 39th American Music Festival, with guest artists and the National Gallery Orchestra, Richard Bales, Conductor, is devoted entirely to works of American composers dating from colonial times to the present day. The Festival concerts are presented in the East Garden Court, West Building, at 7 p.m. each Sunday through May 23. The American Music Festival concerts are broadcast live on Station WGMS 570 AM and 103.5 FM, and are being recorded for later broadcast by National Public Radio.

Gallery Hours: The Gallery is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Sunday hours remain the same throughout the year: 12 noon to 9 p.m.

Free tours on any subject appropriate to the Gallery's collections or exhibitions may be arranged for groups of fifteen or more people by booking at least two weeks in advance. Call (202) 842-6246.

The exhibition has been organized by the International Exhibitions Foundation, which commissioned William S. Lieberman to select the paintings and write the catalogue text. After its premiere at the National Gallery, it will travel to five other U.S. museums.

This project is supported by a grant from United Technologies Corporation. Additional assistance has been received in the form of an indemnity from the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities, and by grants from the Government of the Canton of Ticino, the Tourist Office of Ticino, and the Lugano Tourist Office.

Lecture: On Sunday, June 20, Gregory Hedberg, chief curator at the Wadsworth Atheneum in Hartford, will deliver a lecture on the exhibition at 4 p.m. in the East Building Auditorium.

from the Mauritshuis, the small palace in The Hague, formerly a royal residence, which houses one of the finest collections of seventeenth-century Dutch painting.

This exhibition is made possible in Washington by a generous grant from General Telephone & Electronics.

A catalogue illustrating every work in color with scholarly essays by Dr. H.R. Hoetink, director of the Mauritshuis, and entries by F.J. Duparc, curator of paintings at the Mauritshuis, accompanies the exhibition.

Goltzius, and two by Jacob de Gheyn are included, as are major examples by Cornelis Dusart, Jacob van Loo, Adriaen van de Velde, and other artists less well known in the United States.

The exhibition was organized by the print room of the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam in conjunction with the National Gallery. The accompanying illustrated catalogue contains essays and entries by Peter Schatborn, curator of drawings at the Rijksmuseum.

The 1982 Andrew W. Mellon Lectures in the Fine Arts will be given by Leo Steinberg, Benjamin Franklin Professor of the History of Art, The University of Pennsylvania. Dr. Steinberg will discuss "The Burden of Michelangelo's Painting" in a series of seven lectures on consecutive Sundays beginning May 2 and continuing through June 13. He will speak at 4 p.m. in the East Building Auditorium. (Please check listings for details.)
