

Mellon Lectures Begin

The 1983 Andrew W. Mellon Lectures in the Fine Arts will be given by Vincent Scully, Colonel John Trumbull Professor of the History of Art at Yale University. Entitled "The Shape of France," the series of six lectures on consecutive Sundays begins January 23 in the East Building Auditorium. Gallery Hours: The Gallery is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Sunday 12 noon to 9 p.m. Closed New Year's Day.

The Gallery is located between 3rd and 7th Streets, N.W., on Constitution Avenue. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway. Entrances to the West Building are on the Mall, on Constitution Avenue at 6th Street, which has a ramp for the handicapped, and off 4th Street. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street off National Gallery Plaza and also has a ramp for the handicapped.

the second part, Raphael's role in the cultural history of the United States is examined, through works of American artists who were inspired by the Italian master. American collectors and their Raphaels are documented by means of photographs, news clippings, albums, and other visual evidence. The exhibition and an accompanying film have been supported by a generous grant from the National Italian American foundation.

David A. Brown, curator of early Italian painting at the National Gallery, has organized the exhibition and prepared an accompanying catalogue. He will present a lecture on Sunday, January 9. In addition, the Tour of the Week for January 11-16 will be devoted to this exhibition. See reverse side for details.

The exhibition in Washington is made possible by a generous contribution from Johnson Wax. Originated by the National Gallery, it will subsequently be seen at the Amon Carter Museum in Fort Worth, Texas (July 15-September 18, 1983).

Organizer of the exhibition is John Wilmerding, curator of American art and senior curator at the National Gallery. Mr. Wilmerding is the author of a monograph on Peto, recently published by the National Gallery, and will deliver a lecture in conjunction with the exhibition on Sunday, January 16. The completed and rebuilt ground floor of the West Building will go on view to the public on February 3. More than 40,000 square feet of former office and exhibition space have been converted to a new museum-within-a-museum exhibiting nearly 2000 drawings, prints, paintings, sculptures, and decorative arts objects from the National Gallery's collection, much of it off view for many years owing to lack of exhibition space.
