The Middle Atlantic Symposium in the History of Art, an annual presentation of art historical papers selected from the work of graduate students at universities in the area, will be held on Saturday, April 23, in the new lecture hall of the West Building. The two sessions will begin at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. The Symposium, which is open to the public, is cosponsored by the Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts and the University of Maryland.

The Gallery is located between 3rd and 7th Streets, N.W., on Constitution Avenue. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street off National Gallery Plaza and also has a ramp for the handicapped.

Painting in Naples from Caravaggio to Giordano
