

# **Opening This Month**

## Master Prints from Washington Private Collections

December 9, 1984-March 3, 1985 Ground Floor Galleries West Building

This exhibition surveys the history of graphic art with prints of exceptional quality by major artists from the fifteenth century to the present, including works by Dürer, Rembrandt, Piranesi, Manet, Degas, Toulouse-Lautrec, Munch, Picasso, and Kirchner. Ninety of the finest prints in Washington area private collections are on view.

Such collections have a long tradition in the area and have expanded greatly in both size and number in recent years. The exhibition coincides with the twentieth anniversary of the Washington Print Club, one of the strongest private forces for the collecting and study of prints in the Washington area. The selection of works has been made by Andrew Robison, the National Gallery's Senior Curator and Curator of Prints and Drawings. An exhibition brochure, also written by Mr. Robison, accompanies the show.

An exhibition of fifty-two hand-colored engravings from the artist's most famous series to celebrate the 200th anniversary of Audubon's birth.

### Old Master Drawings from the Albertina

Through January 13, 1985 Ground Level East Building

From the world-famous collection of the Albertina in Vienna, seventy-five drawings by many of the greatest draftsmen of all time are on view. In addition to ten works by Dürer, including his *Praying Hands*, the exhibition contains drawings by Michelangelo, Raphael, Cranach, Bruegel, Rubens, Van Dyck, Rembrandt, Poussin, Claude, and Fragonard. The exhibition and catalogue are supported by a grant from United Technologies Corporation. The exhibition has been organized by the International Exhibitions Foundation.





# Art and Collaboration

Through February 24, 1985 Concourse Level East Building

This exhibition celebrates the creativity of collaboration—a fusion of the imaginative ideas of contemporary artists with the talents of craftsmen at Gemini G.E.L., the influential print and sculpture workshop in Los Angeles. The show includes 110 works by 30 artists, with major sections devoted to Robert Rauschenberg, Ellsworth Kelly, David Hockney, Jasper Johns, Sam Francis, and Roy Lichtenstein. In addition, a selection of preliminary drawings and working proofs is included.

### **Degas: The Dancers**

This exhibition, which commemorates the 150th anniversary of Degas' birth, unites some of the artist's most important paintings and sculpture of ballet subjects with the drawings and pastels related to them. Considered one of the greatest draftsmen in Western art, Degas continually drew upon the hundreds of drawings and pastels he made in creating his major works.

# National Gallery of Art

The Gallery is located between 3rd and 7th Streets, N.W., on Constitution Avenue. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway. Entrances to the West Building are on the Mall, on 7th Street, on Constitution Avenue at 6th Street, which has a ramp for the handicapped, and off 4th Street. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street off National Gallery Plaza and also has a ramp for the handicapped.
