Film Series

Painting and Cinema April 5 through June 21 East Building Auditorium

Beginning Saturday, April 5, a free 12-week film and lecture series on Saturday afternoons will explore the ways in which painting has influenced the making of narrative motion pictures. Particular attention is given to the methods by which filmmakers have chosen their subjects and managed the visual effects of their films to reflect painterly values. Included are movies such as Claude Goretta's The Lacemaker, which were inspired by specific works of art. Five of the 12 films in the series, beginning with The Mystery of Picasso, will

be introduced by film scholars and critics. Programs last approximately two hours unless otherwise noted. See other side for information concerning the films to be shown during April.

Titian's Flaying of Marsyas

Through April 20, 1986 Lobby A West Building


On loan from the State Museum in Kroměříž, Czechoslovakia, to the United States for the first time, Titian's Flaying of Marsyas remains on view in the National Gallery of Art's West Building Lobby A. Painted sometime between 1570 and the year of the artist's death in 1576, the painting is widely regarded as one of Titian's masterpieces. Depicting the legend of Apollo and Marsyas, the painting graphically depicts the winner of a musical contest, Apollo, as he calmly flays the live satyr Marsyas.

Baroque Paintings from the John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art

April 6-September 29, 1986 Main Floor Galleries West Building


The John and Mable Ringling Museum of Art, which owns one of America's most noted collections of baroque paintings, is celebrating its 40th anniversary of state ownership. To commemorate this occasion a group of 33 paintings from what is now the State Museum of Florida will be on view in the National Gallery's West Building Main Floor.

The collection, formed chiefly in the 1920s by John Ringling, the famous circus entrepreneur, and his wife, Mable Burton Ringling, includes many exceptional Italian and northern baroque masterpieces.

Winslow Homer Watercolors

Through May II, 1986 Ground Floor Central Gallery West Building

To commemorate the 150th anniversary of the birth of Winslow Homer (1836-1910), an exhibition of the artist's most distinguished watercolors is on view in the National Gallery's West Building Ground Floor Central Gallery. Selected from 60 public and private American collections, these works demonstrate this great American artist's skill in the watercolor technique. The exhibition has been organized by Helen A. Cooper, curator of American paintings and sculpture

Drawings by Jacques de Gheyn


Through May II, 1986 Ground Floor East Building

This exhibition, the first devoted exclusively to the drawings of this remarkable Dutch artist, will feature 100 of Jacques de Gheyn's finest works. Jacques de Gheyn (1565-1629) is noted for his intensely expressive studies of humans, plants, animals, and landscapes, as well as his early mannerist figures and his bizarre scenes of witchcraft. The exhibition has been organized by the National Gallery of Art and the Museum Boymans-van Beuningen in Rotterdam. It is supported by an indemnity from the United States Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities.

at the Yale University Art Gallery. Winslow Homer Watercolors is supported by a generous grant from the IBM Corporation. A special installation highlighting Winslow Homer oil paintings from the Gallery's permanent collection is on view in West Building Gallery 68. Supplemented by three pictures from the collection of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mellon, the group may be seen through May II.





The New Painting: Impressionism 1874-1886

Through April 6, 1986 Main Floor Galleries West Building

Commemorating the 100th anniversary of the last of eight exhibitions held by the impressionists from 1874 through 1886, a selection of 150 paintings remains on view through April 6 in the West Building's new 19th-century galleries on the Main Floor. The exhibition represents a view of individual artistic achievement as well as the evolution of the impressionist movement and includes works by Monet, Degas, Renoir, Cézanne, Pissarro, Sisley, Cassatt, Morisot, Redon, Seurat, Gauguin, Boudin, and Caillebotte. The New Painting has been made possible by AT&T.

The Treasure Houses of Britain: Five Hundred Years of Private Patronage and Art Collecting

Extended through April 13, 1986 Mezzanine and Upper Levels East Building

Tracing the British country house tradition of art collecting over the past 500 years, The Treasure Houses of Britain exhibition closes after an overwhelmingly popular run. The installation is evocative of the settings from which the objects have come – more than 200 lending houses, most of which are open to the public in Great Britain.

Included in the exhibition are paintings by Rubens, Van Dyck, Holbein, Velázquez, Canaletto, Hogarth, Gainsborough, and Sargent; sculpture by Praxiteles, Canova, Flaxman, and Henry Moore; furniture by Boulle, Kent, and Chippendale; Meissen, Sèvres, and Chelsea as well as Chinese porcelain; and examples of tapestries, armor, jewelry, silver, and other decorative arts. The exhibition has been made possible by Ford Motor Company.


Passes may be obtained only at the exhibition desk on the Ground Floor of the East Building on the day of entry.
