

Anthony van Dyck

In commemoration of the 350th anniversary of the death of Anthony van Dyck, this exhibition of more than 100 oil paintings and oil sketches from all periods of this Flemish master's career will demonstrate his extraordinary artistic genius. Ten paintings from the National Gallery's collection will be shown along with other of the artist's greatest creations from around the world. Early works include Moses and the Brazen Serpent from the Museo del Prado in Madrid and the Self-Portrait from The State Hermi-

tage Museum in Leningrad. From his Italian period are a number of magnificent portraits, including the National Gallery's recently restored Marchese Elena Grimaldi. His important altarpiece from his second Antwerp period, Saint Augustine in Ecstasy from the Koninklijk Museum voor Schone Kunsten in Antwerp, has been lent to the exhibition as well as his large mythological scene depicting Rinaldo and Armida from The Baltimore Museum of Art. Van Dyck's achievements as a court artist for King Charles I in London are

Eva/Ave: Woman in Renaissance and **Baroque Prints**

November 25, 1990 through April 28, 1991 West Building, Ground Floor

This exhibition of 154 woodcuts, metalcuts, engravings, and etchings examines the many ways in which woman was represented in prints of the fifteenth through seventeenth centuries. The works were made by a wide range of artists including Martin Schongauer, Israhel von Meckenem, Mantegna, Dürer, and Rembrandt. They are arranged in several major thematic sections, including the Virgin and Saints, the Worthies, Eve, Venus, Fortune, and Lovers. The juxtaposition of the prints in the exhibition gives them new vibrancy, while it also conveys the widely held Renaissance view that women had two conflicting

natures: good and evil, quintessentially expressed by the Virgin and Eve. Included in the selection are Dürer's The Birth of the Virgin from The Life of the Virgin series and Rembrandt's Adam and Eve.

The curator of Eva/Ave: Woman in Renaissance and Baroque Prints is H. Diane Russell, National Gallery curator of old master prints. A fully illustrated exhibition catalogue produced by the Gallery includes essays by Russell and Bernadine Barnes, assistant professor of art history, Wake Forest University. The National Gallery is the sole venue for the exhibition

represented by Charles I in Three Positions, lent by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, and Three Eldest Children of Charles I, from Galleria Sabauda, Turin

Anthony van Dyck was organized by Arthur Wheelock, curator of northern baroque painting at the National Gallery of Art, and Susan Barnes, senior curator at the Dallas Museum of Art and former assistant dean of the Center for Advanced Study in the Visual Arts. The fullyillustrated catalogue was written by Wheelock and Barnes, with contributions by Julius Held and other Van Dyck scholars. The National Gallery is the only venue of the exhibition, which is supported by an indemnity from the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities.

Titian, Prince of **Painters**

Through January 27, 1991 West Building, Main Floor, **NW** Galleries

Titian, Prince of Painters is the first major exhibition of paintings by this Venetian Renaissance master ever held in the United States. The exhibition, which commemorates the 500th anniversary of Titian's birth, was organized by the Comune di Venezia, Assessorato alla Cultura, the Ministero per i Beni Culturali e Ambientali, Soprintendenza ai Beni Artistici e Storici di Venezia, and the National Gallery of Art, Washington, with Galileo Industrie Ottiche, Venezia. It is also made possible by Silvio Berlusconi Communications. Approximately fifty paintings from public and private collections throughout the world represent Titian's entire career. Thirteen of the painting.

works have been recently cleaned and restored for the exhibition. These include two portraits from the Galleria degli Uffizi, Florence, Eleonora Gonzaga and Francesco Maria della Rovere, and the National Gallery's Feast of the Gods, a painting that was the basis for a special exhibition here in February of this year. A highlight of Titian, Prince of Painters is the reconstruction of a typical Renaissance coffered ceiling in which the National Gallery's ceiling painting of Saint John the Evangelist on Patmos has been be united with nineteen of the original surrounding panels.

A fully illustrated catalogue accompanies the show. The exhibition is supported by an indemnity from the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities. The exhibition at the National Gallery is coordinated by David Alan Brown, curator of Italian Renaissance


CLOSING EXHIBITIONS

Kazimir Malevich 1878-1935

Through November 4, 1990 East Building, Mezzanine and Upper Level

Comprising 170 paintings, works on paper, and architectural models, this exhibition is the largest and most comprehensive retrospective ever held in the United States of the work of Russian artist Kazimir Malevich, one of the seminal figures of modern art. The selected works are representative of all phases of his career that includes impressionism, symbolism, neo-primitivism, and cubofuturism. His best-known abstract "Suprematist" compositions and his final phase of figurative works are also featured in the exhibition.

The selection, drawn principally from the holdings of the State Russian Museum, the Tretiakov Gallery. and the Stedelijk Museum, is a reshaping of the celebrated 1988-1989 Malevich exhibition held in Leningrad, Moscow, and Amsterdam. That was the first time in nearly six decades that a retrospective of the artist's work had been seen in his own land. The National Gallery show includes, in addition, major works from the United States, France, and other Soviet sources. Angelica Zander Rudenstine, the consulting curator for Kazimir Malevich 1878-

exhibition at the National Gallery. The exhibition was organized by the National Gallery of Art, The Armand Hammer Museum of Art and Cultural Center, Los Angeles, and The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, following an

The Sculpture of Indonesia

Through November 4, 1990 East Building, Upper Level

The first major exhibition of ancient Indonesian art ever assembled in the United States from sources around the world inaugurates an eighteenmonth nationwide celebration of Indonesian culture. Among the more than 135 works in the exhibition at the National Gallery are Buddhist and Hindu life-size stone sculpture. bronzes, delicate figures made of gold and silver, and ceremonial objects dating from the eighth through fifteenth centuries. One of the greatest treasures in the exhibition is a superbly carved and perfectly preserved thirteenthcentury sculpture of the Goddess of Transcendental Wisdom, which is also thought to be a portrait of the first queen of the Eastern Javanese dynasty of Singasari. The show also contains the only surviving example of a ninth-century bronze of the four-armed Siva with precious metal inlay. Jan Fontein, former director of the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, and currently its Matsutaro Shoriki curator for research in the department of Asiatic art, is the guest curator for The Sculpture of Indonesia.

The fully illustrated catalogue includes entries on the objects, essays by Fontein and Indonesian scholars R. Soekmono and Edi Sedyawati, and color photographs of monument sites. After closing at the National Gallery on November 4, the show will travel to the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston, December 9, 1990-March 17, 1991; The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, April 27-August 18, 1991; and the Asian Art Museum, San Francisco, September 28, 1991-January 5, 1992.
