During the first two weeks of June, films on dance will be shown in conjunction with the exhibition Degas Waxes. The first, Dancing for Mr. B. (1989), examines the unique relationship between six celebrated American ballerinas and their mentor and choreographer, George Balanchine. The second, *Reflections* of a Dancer (1982), is a portrait of the legendary Russian prima ballerina Alexandra Danilova. Both films were produced and directed by Anne Belle. Degas: The Unquiet Spirit, written and narrated by David Thompson, is also shown in conjunction with the exhibition.

Voices in Celebration, a new film providing a behind-the-scenes look at the National Gallery of Art, will be shown throughout the month (see the daily schedule for dates and times).

"The Studio Film, 1937 to 1941," a series of American films from the period of the founding of the National Gallery of Art, continues through the end of June. Most of the films in the series are from the collections of the Library of Congress, the UCLA Film and Television Archive, and Turner Entertainment Co., and reflect the efforts of these organizations to preserve the cinema of this era. 

OPENING EXHIBITION

Soap Bubbles of Jean-Siméon Chardin

June 30-September 2, 1991 West Building Main Floor Gallery

Three autograph versions of Jean-Siméon Chardin's famous composition of a boy blowing soap bubbles comprise the subject of this closely focused exhibition. One version of Soap Bubbles belongs to the National Gallery of Art, a second to The Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the third to the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Supplementing these works are Chardin's painting of a woman playing knucklebones, which is known to have been a pendant of one version of Soap Bubbles; two engravings made by Pierre Filloeul after Soap Bubbles and Knucklebones; and x-radiographs of all four paintings, as well as other didactic material.

Chardin, who was born in 1699, was known for his ability to evoke the virtues of the domestic life of the middle class in eighteenth-century France. The exhibition will address such issues as why some artists often repeated their compositions, why autograph replicas and prints after paintings appeal to different audiences, and what technical study can teach us about an artist's methods and materials





Since 1985, leading contemporary artist Robert Rauschenberg has visited Mexico, Chile, Venezuela, Beijing, Lhasa, Japan, Cuba, the Soviet Union, Berlin, and Malaysia as part of the Rauschenberg Overseas Culture Interchange (ROCI). In each location the artist collected images and materials, met with artistic communities, and explored the cities and countryside. He also took photographs while his staff made videotapes to record what the artist saw and experienced. The exhibition is made up of more than 171 paintings, drawings, works of sculpture, and photographs inspired

by his exploration of these diverse cultures. From his more traditional Mexico paintings, such as Mexican Canary and Altar Peace, to his witty and engaging sculptures from Tibet, such as Armadillo and Honky Tonk, the colorful art of ROCI displays Rauschenberg's acute powers of observation, experimentation, and the creative application of his artistic past.

The exhibition is part of the Gallery's year-long 50th anniversary celebration and includes 29 works donated to the National Gallery of Art. Among the gifts are several new works such as four ROCI USA (Wax

Mezzanine, Upper Level, and Tower A series of 25 galleries has been designed and built to accommodate a greatly expanded reinstallation of the twentieth-century collection complemented by loans from private collections. Among the works presented are Family of Saltimbanques by Picasso, Lavender Mist by Jackson Pollock, and The Stations of the Cross by Barnett

Newman.




The National Gallery of Art continues the celebration of its 50th Anniversary with several activities, including this exhibition featuring 330 works of art committed to the Gallery by more than 150 private donors throughout America and Europe. The gifts of paintings, draw ings, prints, sculpture, illustrated books, and photographs are installed in several sections representing old master, nineteenth century, twentieth century, and contemporary periods as well as a special installation of original wax sculpture by Edgar Degas. The show also includes gifts purchased with funds donated by the National Gallery 50th Anniversary Gift Committee, whose members include individuals, foundations, and corporations from across the country. The exhibition is made possible by a grant from GTE Corporation.

The National Gallery's holdings have grown over the years through donations of masterpieces of European and American paintings,
