Voices in Celebration, a new forty-five minute film that provides a behind-the-scenes look at the National Gallery of Art, will be shown throughout the month. The film is directed by Academy Award-winning director Aviva Slesin (see daily schedule for times). CONTINUING EXHIBITIONS

Rauschenberg Overseas Culture Interchange

Through September 2, 1991
East Building, Main Floor and Concourse Galleries

Since 1985, leading contemporary American artist Robert Rauschenberg has visited Mexico, Chile, Venezuela, Beijing, Lhasa, Japan, Cuba, the Soviet Union, Berlin, and Malaysia as part of the Rauschenberg Overseas Culture Interchange (ROCI). In each location the artist collected images and materials, met with artists, and explored the cities

and countryside. He also took photographs while his staff made videotapes to record what the artist saw and experienced. The exhibition is made up of 150 paintings, drawings, works of sculpture, and photographs inspired by his exploration of these diverse cultures. From his more traditional Mexico paintings, such as Mexican Canary and Altar Peace, to

his witty and engaging sculptures from Llasa, such as Armadillo and Honky Tonk, the colorful art of ROCI displays Rauschenberg's acute powers of observation, experimentation, and the creative application of his artistic past. The exhibition is part of the Gallery's year-long 50th anniversary celebration and includes 29 works donated to the National Gallery of Art. Among the gifts are four works for ROCI USA (Wax Fire Works), which were created for the final stop of Rauschenberg's world tour at the Gallery and have not been seen before by the public

Sky House I, a kite painting by Robert Rauschenberg, made in the Japanese "Edo" style, has been installed in the East Building atrium through September 2, as part of the exhibition.

The Other ROCI, a video produced for the BBC Arena Series, is shown daily in the small auditorium on the Concourse level of the East Building.

The exhibition for the National Gallery was organized by Jack Cowart, head of the department and curator of twentieth-century art. A fully illustrated catalogue, published by the National Gallery of Art and Prestel, accompanies the exhibition.

Soap Bubbles of Jean-Siméon Chardin

Through September 2, 1991 West Building Main Floor Gallery

Three autograph versions of Jean-Siméon Chardin's famous composition of a boy blowing soap bubbles comprise the subject of this closely focused exhibition. The paintings belong to the National Gallery of Art, The Metropolitan Museum of Art, and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Accompanying these works are Chardin's painting of a woman playing knucklebones, which is known to have been a pendant, or companion piece of one version of Soap Bubbles; two engravings made by Pierre Filloeul after Soap Bubbles and Knucklebones; and x-radiographs of all four paintings, as well as supplemental didactic material.

Chardin, who was born in 1699, was known for his ability to evoke the virtues of the domestic life of the middle class in eighteenth-century France. The exhibition will address such issues as why some artists often repeated their compositions and what technical research can teach us both about an artist's materials and methods and about changes of composition and format that may take place during or after the artist's lifetime.

The exhibition was organized at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art by Philip Conisbee, curator of European painting and sculpture, and Joseph Fronek, senior conser-

vator of paintings. Coordinators at the National Gallery are Peter Lukehart, Mellon assistant curator of southern baroque painting, and Marcia Kupfer, associate curator, exhibition programs, education division.

Circa 1492: Art in the Age of Exploration

October 12, 1991–January 12, 1992 East Building, Mezzanine, and Upper Level

On October 12, the National Gallery will present Circa 1492: Art in the Age of Exploration, one of the most comprehensive exhibitions in its fifty-year history. More than 600 paintings, sculpture, drawings, and decorative objects, as well as maps and scientific instruments, from Europe and Africa, Asia, and the Americas will represent the full spectrum of the creative arts at the dawn of the modern era.

Among the places from which the Gallery is borrowing works of art are Austria, Belgium, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, the Dominican Republic, England, France, Germany, Hong Kong, India, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Korea, Mexico, The Netherlands, Nigeria, the People's Republic of China, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Puerto Rico, Saudi Arabia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Taiwan, and Turkey. Works by artists as diverse as Leonardo da Vinci, Albrecht Dürer, Sesshu Toyo, Shen Zhou, Islamic scribes, the bronze casters of Benin, and the master sculptors and goldsmiths of the Americas will be organized into three major sections: "Europe and the Mediterranean World," "Toward Cathay," and "The Americas."

Rembrandt's Lucretias

September 22, 1991– January 5, 1992 West Building, Main Floor

The National Gallery of Art's painting by Rembrandt of *Lucretia* (1664) will be brought together with the artist's 1666 depiction of this ancient heroine, which is one of the great treasures of the Minneapolis Institute of Art. The exhibition of these two masterpieces will be the first time that Rembrandt's moving depictions of Lucretia have ever been shown together.

The two boldly executed paintings, which date from the end of Rembrandt's career, convey the profound tragedy of Lucretia's suicide. While the similar compositions of the two paintings complement each other, they do not seem to have been created as a pair. The National Gallery version depicts the heroine with knife in hand, in anticipation of her self-sacrifice, while the Minneapolis image portrays Lucretia after her chemise has been stained by blood from the mortal wound.

Compositional and thematic prototypes from northern and Venetian sources that affected Rembrandt's concepts will be displayed as well as information about Rembrandt's painting techniques. An illustrated brochure will accompany the exhibition.

Graphicstudio: Contemporary Art from the Collaborative Workshop at the University of South Florida

September 15, 1991–January 5, 1991 West Building, Ground Floor

This exhibition, drawn from the National Gallery's Graphicstudio, U.S.F. Archive, will feature prints and edition sculpture, shown with preliminary drawings and other related materials by more than twenty distinguished artists including Chuck Close, Jim Dine, Lee Friedlander, Nancy Graves, Roy Lichtenstein, Philip Pearlstein, Robert Rauschenberg, and James Rosenquist. Ranging from closely studied figurative imagery to more expressionistic pieces as well as numerous approaches to abstraction, works in etching and lithography,

specially developed methods of woodcut and screenprinting, photographs, and multi-media works of the most experimental variety will be included.

Craphicstudio founded at the

Graphicstudio, founded at the University of South Florida in 1968 is one of the foremost collaborative workshops in the United States. The archive collection of the workshop's publications, which number more than 250 works, was established at the National Gallery in 1986 as a gift of the University of South Florida and the artists.

Entrances to the West Building are on the Mall, on 7th Street, on Constitution Avenue at 6th Street, which has a ramp for the handicapped, and on 4th Street. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street off National Gallery Plaza and also has a ramp for the handicapped.
