Masters of Illusion, a new half-hou documentary film produced by the National Gallery of Art, will be shown daily beginning October 12 in conjunction with the exhibition Circa 1492: Art in the Age of Exploration. Using special effects to illustrate dramatically how the works of the Renaissance masters were created, the film focuses on the discovery of linear perspective and the use of color and shading to create the illusion of depth in space. This film has been made possible by the support of Canon U.S.A., Inc. and Canon, Inc.

A series of art films by Philip Haas is scheduled for the first three weekends of October. Opening with his acclaimed 1989 film A Day on the Grand Canal with the Emperor of China—produced in collaboration with artist David Hockney—the series includes recent portraits of traditional artists in Madagascar and Senegal, and studies of Richard Long, Boyd Webb, and Gilbert and George. Mr. Haas will introduce the program on October 5.

A number of documentary films and videos on artists represented in Graphicstudio: Contemporary Art from the Collaborative Workshop at the University of South Florida is scheduled throughout October. Video interviews with Chuck Close, Alice Avcock, Jim Dine, and Nancy Graves are among those featured.



OPENING EXHIBITIONS

Circa 1492: Art in the Age of Exploration

October 12, 1991–January 12, 1992

The National Gallery presents Circa 1492: Art in the Age of Exploration, the most wide-ranging exhibition in its fifty-year history. The exhibition, comprising more than 600 paintings. sculpture, drawings, and decorative objects, as well as maps and scientific instruments, from Europe and Africa, Asia, and the Americas, surveys the visual arts at the dawn of the modern era. Among the places from which the Gallery is borrowing works of art are Austria, Belgium, Chile, the People's Republic of China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Denmark, the Dominican Republic, England, France, Germany, Hong Kong, India, Ireland, Israel, Italy, Japan, Korea, Mexico, The Netherlands, Nigeria, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Puerto Rico, Saudi Arabia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Taipei. Turkey, and the United States.

Circa 1492 will be open on Friday evenings until 8:00 for the duration of the exhibition.

The exhibition is organized into three major sections: "Europe and the Mediterranean World," "Toward Cathay," and "The Americas." After a prologue that shows medieval notions of distant lands, "Europe and the Mediterranean World " presents the artistic cultures of Portugal, Spain, Italy, West Africa. and the Islamic World. Included in this section are works by Leonardo da Vinci and Albrecht Dürer, whose wide-ranging interests symbolize the breadth of the period's quest for knowledge

"Toward Cathay" examines the civilizations of Japan, Korea, China, and India through the paintings, sculpture, calligraphy, and works of

"The Americas," the final section, surveys the art of the great empires of the Aztecs and Inkas as well as of smaller chiefdoms. On view are major works of Aztec sculpture and pre-Hispanic Mexican codices, precious textiles from the Inka Empire, and masterful works in gold from Colombia and Costa Rica.

In conjunction with the exhibition, several educational programs are planned including a two-day public symposium on the weekend following Thanksgiving, four Sunday lectures, a Tuesday lunchtime lecture series, slide overviews, and recorded tours. Check this and future calendars for details.



This exhibition presents more than ninety prints and edition sculpture by leading contemporary artists such as Chuck Close, Jim Dine, Lee Friedlander, Nancy Graves, Roy Lichtenstein, Philip Pearlstein, Robert Rauschenberg, and James Rosenquist. The innovative works were produced by artists in collaboration with the printers and craftspeople at Graphicstudio at the University of South Florida in Tampa. The objects range from closely studied figurative representatives to expressionist and abstract images. The exhibition comprises etchings and lithographs woodcuts and screenprints created through specially developed methods and techniques, as well as photographs and multimedia editions of the most experimental variety. In addition to the completed works, the show includes a selection of related drawings and other preparatory material never before exhibited.

Graphicstudio, founded in 1968 by

artist Donald J. Saff, is one of the leading print workshops in the United States engaged in research toward the production of fine arts editions. The works in the exhibition are drawn from the National Gallery's Graphicstudio Archive collection, which was established in 1986 and numbers more than 250 pieces.



Archives on the Yellow Line, and Smithsonian on the Blue/Orange Line. Metrobus stops are located on 4th Street and 7th Street. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway. Entrances to the West Building are on the Mall, on 7th Street, on Constitution Avenue at 6th Street, which has a ramp for the handicapped, and on 4th Street. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street off National Gallery Plaza and also has a ramp for the handicapped.
