Permanent Collection

Impressionism and Postimpressionism: The National Gallery of Art will continue to test a new digitized tour system called "Inform," which allows random access to interpretive commentary on paintings in the French impressionist and postimpressionist galleries. "Inform" replaces the conventional taped audio tour, which offers information on a number of paintings along a fixed route. The new self-selected approach lets the visitor choose to listen to commentary on any or all of the works programmed for the "Inform" system. In addition to enjoying the freedom of a personally selected tour, the visitor may also limit the length of the commentary he or she wishes to hear on a particular work or enlarge upon it by pressing designated keys. Narrated by Philip Conisbee, curator of French paintings.

"Inform" tours are \$4.00 (\$3.50 for senior citizens, students, and groups of ten or more). They may be rented near the Rotunda, on the Main Floor of the West Building.

The Director's Tour, narrated by Earl A. Powell III, discusses fifteenth-through early twentieth-century masterpieces and includes some of the Gallery's best-loved paintings.

American Art, narrated by Nicolai Cikovsky, Jr., curator of American and British paintings, features works by Copley, Stuart, Homer, Eakins, Whistler, Bellows, and other masters from the Gallery's collection of American painting.

Gemini G.E.L.: Recent Prints and Sculpture

through October 2, 1994 West Building, Ground Floor, Central Gallery

More than seventy works created over the last ten years at the highly acclaimed Los Angeles workshop Gemini G.E.L. are included in this exhibition. The sculpture and graphic art presented reflect currents in contemporary art. On view are works by such artists as Elizabeth Murray and Susan Rothenberg, who are new to the workshop and new to the National Gallery of Art's collection since the first presentation of the Gemini G.E.L. Archive a decade ago.

The exhibition reveals the continuing range and power of the workshop's production, from Claes

Oldenburg's humorously ironic figurative pieces to a group of Richard Serra's austere abstractions.

Both prints and sculpture by Jonathan Borofsky and Robert Rauschenberg are on exhibit along with a group of delicate lithographs completed by Richard Diebenkorn shortly before his death in 1993. New works by other artists with long-established ties to Gemini G.E.L. include prints by Jasper Johns, Ellsworth Kelly, and Roy Lichtenstein, and sculpture by Bruce Nauman and Kenneth Price. In all. twenty-four artists are represented.

Willem de Kooning: Paintings

through September 5, 1994 East Building, Upper and Mezzanine Levels

Celebrating the ninetieth birthday of Willem de Kooning, one of America's most important and influential artists, this major presentation is the first devoted exclusively to the virtuosity and compelling mastery of his paintings. It brings together seventysix of his most original works from the late 1930s to the mid-1980s.

Willem de Kooning: Paintings begins with the artist's early depictions of men and women, followed by a selection of his acclaimed blackand-white and color abstractions from 1946 to 1950. Several of his provocative paintings of women from the 1950s are shown, along with a group of urban and highway landscapes. Selections from his woman series as well as his lush paintings of figures in landscapes represent his production throughout the 1960s and early 1970s. De Kooning's ultimate synthesis of figuration and abstraction, color and line, painting and drawing are revealed in his luminous late works of the 1980s.

The exhibition is organized by the National Gallery of Art in association with the Tate Gallery, London, and The Metropolitan Museum of Art,

New York. It is accompanied by a fully illustrated catalogue. The exhibition will travel to The Metropolitan Museum of Art, October 11, 1994-January 8, 1995, and the Tate Gallery, February 16-May 7, 1995. An indemnity for the exhibition has been granted by the Federal Council on the Arts and the

Fanciful Flourishes: Ornament in European Graphic Art and Related Objects, 1300–1800

through August 21, 1994 East Building, Ground Level

Ninety prints, drawings, illustrated books, and decorative objects from the National Gallery of Art's collection present the beauty, imagination, and delightful - sometimes outrageous - wit of graphic and decorative arts over five centuries. Combining works on paper and such three-dimensional objects as ceramics, bronzes, armor, and furniture, the exhibition demonstrates the close relationship between the graphic and decorative arts.

The exhibition is organized according to the style of ornament depicted—grotesques, arabesques, calligraphy, rocaille - or the kinds of objects the designs were intended to decorate. Among the works on paper are ingenious designs by eminent artists for functional objects as well as fantastic decorative works produced for their own sake.

The newly conserved early Netherlandish masterpiece, the Annunciation (c. 1434/1436) by Jan van Eyck, is one of the jewels of the National Gallery of Art's permanent collection. A magnificently detailed tour de force of Christian symbolism. the painting portrays the moment when the angel Gabriel announces to the Virgin Mary that she will be the mother of Jesus.

The Annunciation is among twenty-one paintings acquired by

Andrew W. Mellon from Russia's Imperial Hermitage Museum in 1930 Two manuscript illuminations depicting the Annunciation in Books of Hours — one from the collection of the J. Paul Getty Museum, Malibu, and the other from The Walters Art Gallery, Baltimore—are also on view

Jasper Francis Cropsey's The Spirit of War and The Spirit of Peace

Two of the most significant works by American painter Jasper Francis Cropsey, The Spirit of War (1851) in the National Gallery of Art and *The* Spirit of Peace (1851) from the Woodmere Art Museum, Philadelphia, are exhibited together in public for the first time since 1857.

The Spirit of Peace is a serene, twilight, semitropical coastal scene with a classical temple, a distant harbor town, and men and women

reflecting, walking, and dancing peacefully. The Spirit of War is a predawn, tempestuous mountain landscape with a fortified castle, knights on horseback, and a plundered village with approaching enemy troops.
