

#### Milton Avery: Works on Paper

September 18, 1994, through January 22, 1995 East Building, Ground Level

On view is a selection of important drypoints, lithographs, woodcuts, monotypes, sketchbooks, and watercolors, many selected from the Milton Avery Print Archive at the National Gallery of Art. A choice group of proofs and variant impressions are among the highlights, revealing the artist's intuitive and highly personal working methods.

Milton Avery (1885–1965) worked in printmaking throughout his career, producing a total of sixty images. His drypoints date from 1933 to 1950; his eight lithographs date mainly from the early 1950s, with the exception of his last print, *Gray Sea* (1963); and the woodcuts were made from 1952 to 1955. The exhibition of fifty-six prints also includes several original drypoint plates and carved woodblocks used for a number of the prints on view. A group of Avery's sketch-

books, two watercolors, and one monotype are also included.

The exhibition celebrates the Avery family's 1991 gift of the Milton Avery Print Archive in honor of the 50th anniversary of the National Gallery of Art.

## **Gemini G.E.L.: Recent Prints and Sculpture**

Through October 2, 1994 West Building, Ground Floor, Central Gallery

A fresh look at contemporary art currents is presented in graphics and sculpture created over the last decade at the Los Angeles workshop Gemini G.E.L. (Graphic Editions Limited). On view are seventy-three objects by some of the foremost artists working today. New works by artists with longestablished ties to Gemini G.E.L. include prints by Jasper Johns, Ellsworth Kelly, and Roy Lichtenstein as well as sculpture by Claes Oldenburg. Among the artists new to the workshop since the first exhibition of the Gemini G.E.L. Archive in 1984 are James Turrell, Dan Flavin, Susan Rothenberg, Elizabeth Murray, and Daniel Buren. In all, twenty-four artists are represented.

Since its founding in 1966, Gemini G.E.L. continues to pioneer the use of a broad spectrum of state-of-the-art techniques and materials, and this exhibition reveals the range and power of the workshop's experiments. The National Gallery of Art's Gemini G.E.L. Archive was established with an initial donation of 256 prints and sculpture editions by twenty-two contemporary artists and has been expanded on a continuing basis.

#### Jasper Francis Cropsey's The Spirit of War and The Spirit of Peace


Through April 16, 1995 West Building, Main Floor Gallery 60

Created as a pair, *The Spirit of War* (1851), from the National Gallery of Art, and *The Spirit of Peace* (1851), from the Woodmere Art Museum, Philadelphia, are two of the most significant works by American painter Jasper Francis Cropsey. They are exhibited together in public for the first time since 1857.

The Spirit of Peace is a serene, semitropical coastal scene with a classical temple, a distant harbor town, and men and women reflecting, walking, and dancing. The contrast, The Spirit of War depicts a tempestuous mountain landscape with a fortified castle, knights on horseback, and a plundered village with approaching enemy troops. Wall texts with Cropsey's own descriptions give insight into the two paintings.


#### From Minimal to **Conceptual Art: Works from The Dorothy and Herbert Vogel Collection**

Through November 27, 1994 East Building, Mezzanine Level

The exhibition showcases the collection of New Yorkers Dorothy and Herbert Vogel, who have assembled a comprehensive group of contemporary art from the 1960s to the present. Focusing on minimal, postminimal, and conceptual art, the exhibition marks the first major showing of the Vogels' collection since its transfer to the National Gallery of Art in 1991. The works on view, ranging in media from drawings and photographs to paintings and sculpture, illustrate the radical expansion of intellectual and stylistic expression in the United States and Europe since the 1960s.

Among the forty-nine artists represented in the exhibition are Carl Andre, Lynda Benglis, Robert Mangold, Brice Marden, Edda Renouf, Robert Smithson, and Richard Tuttle, with wall drawings by Robert Barry, Sol LeWitt, and Lawrence Weiner. An illustrated catalogue accompanies the exhi-

#### **The Waking Dream: Photography's First Century. Selections** from the Gilman **Paper Company** Collection



"Was it a vision, or a waking dream?" A line from John Keats' poem "Ode to a Nightingale" inspired the title for this exhibition. On view is one of the world's outstanding private collections of photographs.

The exhibition presents almost 250 exceptional photographs, from the birth of photography in 1839 through its first century. Including photographs from Europe, the Near East, Asia, and the United States, the exhibition not only chronicles the medium's progression as an art form, it also records

Jan van Eyck's early Netherlandish masterpiece, the Annunciation (c. 1434/1436), one of the jewels of the National Gallery of Art's permanent collection, is on view after a meticulous two-year restoration. A magnificently detailed tour de force of Christian symbolism, the painting portrays the angel Gabriel announcing to the Virgin Mary that she will be the mother of Jesus. Acquired by Andrew W. Mellon from Russia's Imperial Hermitage Museum in 1930, the Annunciation is an important part of the founding collection of the Gallery given to the nation.

Two manuscript illuminations depicting the Annunciation in Books of Hours — one from the collection of the J. Paul Getty Museum, Malibu, and the other from The Walters Art Gallery, Baltimore — are also on view.

#### Willem de Kooning: **Paintings**

Through September 5, 1994 East Building, Upper and Mezzanine Levels

To honor Willem de Kooning's ninetieth birthday, seventy-six of his finest paintings are presented, spanning nearly fifty years of his long, productive career. The exhibition begins with the

artist's depictions of male and female figures made in New York City in the late 1930s and early 1940s. These are followed by a diverse selection of works from the late 1940s, including black and white compositions, color abstractions, and a second series of woman paintings. In 1950 de Kooning embarked on his third series of women, executed in a vigorously gestural style. Many of these are included here along with a group of urban abstractions from the mid-1950s and several expansive highway landscapes from the end of the decade. In 1963 de Kooning moved permanently to East Hampton, Long Island, where he continued to explore the figure and landscape in a number of lushly colored paintings in the 1960s and 1970s. The exhibition ends with nine large, calligraphic compositions from the 1980s that are among the most luminous works of the artist's career.

The exhibition is organized by the National Gallery of Art in association with the Tate Gallery, London, and The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York. It is accompanied by a fully illustrated catalogue. The exhibition will travel to The Metropolitan Museum of Art, October 11, 1994 – January 8, 1995, and the Tate Gallery, February 16 – May 7, 1995.

Impressionism and Post-Impressionism The National Gallery of Art will continue to test a digitized system called "Inform," which allows individualized access to interpretive commentary on paintings in the French impressionist and postimpressionist galleries. "Inform' replaces the conventional taped audio tour, which offers information on a number of paintings along a fixed route. The new selfselected approach lets the visitor choose to listen to commentary on any or all of the works programmed into the "Inform" system. In addition to enjoying the freedom of a personally selected tour, the visitor may also limit the length of the commentary he or she wishes to hear on a particular work or enlarge upon it by pressing designated keys. #### Cahiers du Cinéma Selects A series of French films recently

cited for excellence by the distinguished journal of film criticism Cahiers du Cinéma will be shown on weekends in September. Cahiers du Cinéma Selects includes four narrative films completed between 1991 and 1993 by Jacques Doillon, Philippe Garrel, Hervé Le Roux, and Léos Carax; new documentaries on nouvelle vague director François Truffaut and the Vichy vears in France; and a representative sampling of earlier French films — including two from the 1950s by Jean Renoir — praised by Cahiers du Cinéma editors and critics. The series was arranged in cooperation with the Film Society of Lincoln Center, the editors of Cahiers du Cinéma, and the Film Bureau of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
