Masterpieces from the Palazzo Doria Pamphilj, Rome

Through September 2, 1996 West Building, main floor, gallery 56

The Palazzo Doria Pamphilj in Rome houses one of the most celebrated private collections of old master paintings and sculpture in the world. Brought into existence in 1651 by Pope Innocent X Pamphilj (reigned 1644-1655), the collection contains several hundred works by the greatest Italian and northern European painters of the sixteenth, seventeenth, and eighteenth centuries. While the palace is being renovated, the National Gallery of Art has the rare opportunity to present a selection of its greatest paintings and sculpture, including Velázquez' famous portrait of Pope Innocent X and busts

of the pontiff by Bernini and Algardi. Other paintings in the exhibition are Raphael's double portrait of two Renaissance humanists; Salome with the Head of Saint John the Baptist, by the young Titian; Caravaggio's early Rest on the Flight into Egypt; and one of the masterpieces of baroque painting, Guercino's Erminia Discovering the Wounded Tancred. An ideal landscape by Annibale Carracci and paintings by Lorenzo Lotto, Claude Lorrain, and Carlo Saraceni are also on loan from the collection, which has never before been seen in the United States.

This exhibition was organized by The National Gallery, London, in collaboration with the National Gallery of Art, Washington.

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

Thomas Eakins: The Rowing Pictures

Through September 29, 1996 East Building, ground level

The works of the American realist painter Thomas Eakins (1844–1916) are universally regarded as among the masterpieces of American art. For this exhibition, all of his known works depicting rowing subjects—nine paintings and fourteen works on paper—are brought together for the first time.


During the years 1870 to 1874 Eakins planned and executed several major paintings of professional rowers and racing sculls and shells on the Schuylkill River in Philadelphia. These include *The Biglin Brothers Turning the Stake* (The Cleveland Museum of Art), *The*

Champion Single Sculls (Max Schmitt in a Single Scull) (The Metropolitan Museum of Art), and the National Gallery of Art's Biglin Brothers Racing. In these he investigated various pictorial problems, such as the complex physical motions of rowing and how to construct rigorously accurate and convincing perspectives uniting closely observed foreground figures and deep space. They are also the first of his paintings to express what would be his lifelong preoccupation with distinctly modern and national subjects.

The exhibition was organized by the Yale University Art Gallery.

Olmec Art of Ancient Mexico


Through October 20, 1996
East Building, concourse level

This first comprehensive exhibition of Olmec art provides a panoramic view of the artistic achievements of Mexico's earliest (1200 to 300 B.C.) and least-known civilization. The 120 objects in the show were created in Mexico and Central America three thousand years ago, long before the great civilizations of the Maya, Teotihuacan, and Aztec. Among the many highlights of the exhibition are the spectacular multiton "Colossal Head 8" from San Lorenzo, which is leaving Mexico for the first time; an impressive cache of jade and serpentine figurines from La Venta; an acrobat effigy vessel; jade funerary masks and fragments; the intriguing "Young Lord," incised with iconographic designs; and "The Wrestler," one of the most familiar Mesoamerican sculptures.

The exhibition was organized by the National Gallery of Art in collaboration with the Mexican National Council for Culture and the Arts through its National Institute of Anthropology and History.

In the Light of Italy: Corot and Early Open-Air Painting

Through September 2, 1996 West Building, main floor, galleries 74, 75, 76, 79, and 82

In the Light of Italy: Corot and Early Open-Air Painting includes 130 paintings and oil sketches by fortyeight artists, most notably Jean-Baptiste-Camille Corot, one of the greatest landscape painters of the nineteenth century, as well as works by Carl Blechen, Johan Christian Dahl, Simon Denis, Christoffer Wilhelm Eckersberg, Thomas Jones, and Pierre-Henri de Valenciennes. The exhibition chronicles the development of the open-air tradition from its origins in the work of British and French artists in the 1780s to its high point in the works of Corot in the later 1820s.

The exhibition was organized by the National Gallery of Art, Washington, and The Brooklyn Museum, in association with the Saint Louis Art Museum.

CLOSING EXHIBITION

Scenes of Daily Life: Genre Prints from the Housebook Master to Rembrandt van Rijn

Through August 18, 1996 West Building, main floor, gallery 78

This exhibition presents thirtyeight Netherlandish and German prints along with six books from the collections of the National Gallery of Art, dating from the late fifteenth to the late seventeenth centuries. It demonstrates that certain themes and motifs had a long life, although the character of the images was often adapted to fit the demands of changing morals, taste, or fashion. Although religious imagery dominated early printmaking, northern European printmakers also depicted profane subjects. The scenes of everyday life include lovers courting, peasants on their way to market, professions, and illustrations of proverbs. Among the artists represented are Israhel van Meckenem, the Housebook Master, Lucas van Leyden, Albrecht Dürer, Rembrandt van Rijn, and Adriaen van Ostade.

CLOSING EXHIBITION

Jan Steen: Painter and Storyteller

Through August 18, 1996

Forty-eight paintings by Jan Steen (1626–1679) explore the exceptional range of subject and style in this Dutch artist's body of work. Although Steen is one of the most admired Dutch artists, he is also one of the least understood. A masterful painter, with a touch that ranged from a very fine to a very coarse technique, he has been primarily identified as an artist of disorderly low-life genre scenes. Nevertheless, Steen also painted sensitive portraits and refined images of upper-class life, as well as religious and mythological scenes.

This is the first exhibition of Steen's work since a retrospective at the Royal Cabinet of Paintings Mauritshuis, The Hague, in 1959. *Jan Steen* was organized by the National Gallery of Art and the Rijksmuseum, Amsterdam. Paintings are drawn from both these collections, as well as from other major public and private collections in the United States and Europe.

PERMANENT COLLECTION

Skylight Replacement Project/Italian Renaissance Relocation

Selected Italian Renaissance paintings and sculpture have been relocated from the main floor galleries to the ground floor galleries as a result of the West Building skylight and roof replacement project. During this first of four phases, galleries M-I through M-28, the West Sculpture Hall, and connecting lobby to the West Garden Court are closed. Access is still available from the Rotunda to areas beyond the closed galleries.

The West Building roof and skylight system has been in place since the National Gallery of Art opened fifty-five years ago. The new, energy-efficient skylights will provide greater protection for the collections while restoring a light-filled environment.

Micro Gallery

West Building, main floor

The National Gallery of Art's Micro Gallery is the most comprehensive interactive, multimedia computer system in an American art museum. Thirteen computers, installed in the redesigned art information room near the West Building Mall entrance, enable visitors to see in magnified detail nearly every work of art on display in the permanent collection. In addition, thousands of pathways allow users to access subjects, artists, geographic areas, time periods, a pronunciation guide with sound, and more. Visitors can design a personal tour of the collection and print it out to use as a guide in the galleries.



Thomas Eakins: A Motion Portrait, an hour-long film portrait of the artist, will be shown August 7 through II in conjunction with the exhibition Thomas Eakins: The Rowing Pictures. Two classic films on Mexico—both assembled from footage directed by the great Russian filmmaker Sergei Eisenstein (1898-1948) and photographed by the brilliant cinematographer Edward Tissé (1897–1961), but edited by others—will be shown during August: Thunder Over Mexico (1933) and Time in the Sun (1939). In honor of the centenary of the birth of Buckminster Fuller, the film Buckminster Fuller on Spaceship Earth (1971) is scheduled for August 14 through 17.

Hollywood's Rome

Ancient Rome has occupied a place in America's popular culture, especially the cinema, throughout the twentieth century. Given the country's spiritual ties to ancient Rome, whose republican constitution was the model for the American form of democratic government, it is not surprising that American cinema should have turned to classical Rome again and again.

This series presents a selection of Hollywood's Roman films illustrating their development in American cinema from the 1920s to the 1960s. It begins on August 3 with a screening of the silent production of Ben-Hur (1925), starring Ramon Novarro. Music historian Gillian Anderson will lead a ten-piece orchestra in the original orchestral accompaniment for this film. Martin Winkler, professor of classics at George Mason University and editor of Classics and Cinema, organized the series and will lead discussions following some of the programs. He will also provide an introduction to the series on August 4 at 6:00.

Video Program

Olmec Art of Ancient Mexico, produced by the National Gallery of Art, relates the twentieth-century discovery of this powerful and dynamic artistic style. Location

The Gallery is located between 3rd and 7th Streets, NW, on Constitution Avenue. The nearest Metro stops are Judiciary Square on the Red Line, Archives on the Yellow/ Green Lines, and Smithsonian on the Blue/Orange Lines. Metro bus stops are located on 4th Street and 7th Street. The East and West Buildings are connected by an all-weather underground passage with a moving walkway. Entrances to the West Building are on the Mall, on Constitution Avenue at 6th Street, and on 4th Street. The entrance to the East Building is on 4th Street.

Accessibility

Ramps for wheelchairs and strollers are located at the 6th Street entrance to the West Building on Constitution Avenue, NW, and at the 4th Street entrance to the East Building. Wheelchairs and strollers are available at all entrances. For information about access to public areas and galleries, refer to the Brief Guide and Plan of the East and West Buildings at the art information desks. 
