
# Augustus Saint-Gaudens' Memorial to Robert Gould Shaw and the Massachusetts Fifty-fourth Regiment

Through December 14, 1997 West Building, main floor, gallery 66

One of the greatest works of nineteenth-century American sculpture has come to the Gallery on a tenyear-renewable loan from the National Park Service, Saint-Gaudens National Historic Site, Cornish, New Hampshire. Created by Augustus Saint-Gaudens (1848 – 1907), the relief depicts Colonel Shaw and the first African American infantry unit from the North to fight for the Union during the Civil War.

The bronze version of the Shaw Memorial has been on display on

Boston Common since 1897. The artist exhibited a plaster version of this memorial in 1900, which had been on display since 1959 in an outdoor pavilion at the Saint-Gaudens National Historic Site. It was restored in Boston before coming to the Gallery. The sculpture, which measures nearly fifteen feet high, eighteen feet wide, and three feet deep, is shown with rare early plaster sketches for the memorial. The exhibition will remain on view

until December 14, when the West Building's American galleries will close for skylight replacement. The sculpture will return to public view in the fall of 1998.

## Lorenzo Lotto: Rediscovered Master of the Renaissance

Through March 1, 1998 West Building, main floor galleries

This is the first exhibition devoted to Lorenzo Lotto (c. 1480–1556) to be held in the United States, and it presents forty-nine works, including portraits, allegories, and religious paintings.

Lotto's portraits in the exhibition include the likeness of the antiquities collector *Andrea Odoni* (1527), lent by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II; the striking *Portrait of a Lady as Lucretia* (c. 1533) from London's National Gallery; and the melancholic *Portrait of a Young Man* (c. 1530) from the Gallerie dell' Accademia, Venice.

Highlights of the exhibition include several works from the National Gallery's permanent collection, Lorenzo Lotto, *Portrait of a Lady as Lucretia*, c. 1533, The Trustees of the National Gallery, London (bought with contributions from the Benson Family and the NACF).

including Allegory of Virtue and Vice (1505) and Allegory of Chastity (c. 1506), which demonstrate Lotto's fondness for emblems. The depth of his religious beliefs is revealed in the intense and dramatic Christ Carrying the Cross (1526) from the Louvre and the Annunciation (c. 1534–1535) from the Pinacoteca Civica in the town of Recanati. Accompanying the exhibition is a fully illustrated catalogue—see Gallery Shops.

The exhibition is organized by the National Gallery of Art, in association with the Accademia Carrara di Belle Arti, Bergamo.

### **Thomas Moran**

Through January 11, 1998 East Building, mezzanine and upper levels

The first retrospective of works by the preeminent American landscape artist Thomas Moran (1837–1926) includes ninety-seven of his finest oil paintings and watercolors. Some of the watercolors are lent by the National Park Service as part of the 125th anniversary celebration of the creation of Yellowstone National Park.

Moran rose to national prominence when his first great painting of the American West, Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone (1872), was purchased by Congress to hang in the U.S. Capitol. Two years later

Thomas Moran, The Three Tetons,

Congress purchased Chasm of the Colorado (1873-1874), and in 1875, Moran completed his third major western landscape, Mountain of the Holy Cross. Intended to form a grand western triptych, the three paintings are seen together for the first time in this exhibition.

The Three Tetons (1895), which has been lent by The White House, is included in the exhibition, as are Moran's rarely exhibited Italian. English, and Mexican scenes, and his little-known landscapes of the eastern United States. A short video program, which includes archival footage of Yellowstone, is shown continuously in the exhibition, and a fully illustrated exhibition catalogue is available—see Gallery Shops on the Information page.

# **Building a Collection**


Through April 19, 1998 East Building, ground level

This exhibition of one hundred forty works will highlight many of the Gallery's finest acquisitions from the Renaissance to the present, including watercolors, drawings, prints, rare illustrated books, and photographs. Building a Collection explores the many reasons why acquisitions are made, especially the variety of ways the new works relate to those already in the collection.

A highlight of the show is Rembrandt's original copperplate used to produce one of the artist's outstanding late etchings, Abraham Entertaining the Angels (1656).

Major drawings are included by George Bellows, Edgar Degas, Claude Monet, Giovanni Battista Piazzetta, and Giovanni Battista Piranesi; rare artists' proofs of prints by Félix-Hilaire Buhot, Pablo Picasso, and Giovanni Battista Tiepolo; an outstanding series of German drawings and watercolors from the mannerist, baroque, and romantic periods; vintage photographs by André Kertész and William Henry Fox Talbot; and stunning watercolors by Charles Demuth, Edward Hopper, and Charles Sheeler. # M.C. Escher: **A Centennial Tribute**

Through April 26, 1998 East Building, mezzanine northwest

The National Gallery of Art is celebrating the centennial of the birth of Dutch artist Maurits Cornelis Escher (1898–1972) with an exhibition drawn entirely from the Gallery's collection of more than

400 works by the artist. A gifted draftsman, Escher is best known for his compositions of complex interlocking shapes that resemble jigsaw puzzles and architectural designs that are physically impossible to construct. The selection of some eighty-five works includes drawings, linoleum cuts, woodcuts, lithographs, and mezzo-tints, as well as illustrated books and related technical materials

The exhibition is divided into four sections: "Self Portraits," "The World Observed," "Inner Visions," and "Metamorphosis." Among the works on view are Escher's first known print, Escher's Father, G. A. Escher (1916); his last work, Snakes (1969); his only portrait of his wife Tetta (1925); and the visual experiments that brought Escher international acclaim in the 1950s and 1960s, such as the lithograph Print Gallery (1956), and his twenty-three foot-long woodcut Metamorphosis III (1967/1968).

with Saints and Angels (c. 1471) from the Gallery's permanent collection was dedicated in October by the U.S. Postal Service as this year's Holiday Traditional Stamp. The painting, which is on view in gallery M-8 in the West Building, was acquired by the Samuel H. Kress Foundation in 1937.

The artist, Sano di Pietro (1406 -1481), was the most prolific and successful of all Sienese fifteenthcentury painters. He was the master of a large workshop specializing in the production of smallscale devotional images.

Below the two pairs of angels wearing floral wreaths are Saints Jerome, on the left, and Bernardino, on the right. The Virgin, who is larger in scale, illustrating her superior position in the Christian hierarchy, holds the Christ child in her arms. He in turn holds a goldfinch, which is symbolic of his future self-sacrifice for the redemption of sinners.






