OPENING EXHIBITION

John Singer Sargent

February 21 through May 31, 1999

More than 100 paintings and watercolors by John Singer Sargent (1856–1925) represent the American artist's most significant and beautiful works. This is the first time since the retrospective mounted after his death that so many of his works have been shown together. The exhibition presents a survey of the full range of Sargent's art: portraiture, landscape, figure sketches, subject pictures, impressionism, and watercolors. It includes such famous works as Madame X, The Daughters of Edward Darley Boit, and Carnation, Lily, Lily, Rose.

The exhibition is organized by the Tate Gallery, London, in collaboration with the National Gallery of Art, Washington, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston.

OPENING EXHIBITION

American Impressionism and Realism: The Margaret and Raymond Horowitz Collection

January 24 through May 9, 1999

Forty-nine works have been selected for this exhibition from one of the legendary private collections of American impressionist and realist art. Included are paintings that are among the artists' best: William Merritt Chase's The Fairy Tale, Childe Hassam's Poppies, Frank Benson's A Summer Day, and George Bellows' Emma in the Purple Dress, as well as superb pastels, watercolors, and drawings by Chase, Robert Blum, John La Farge, John Singer Sargent, Maurice Prendergast, and others. This is the first exhibition of the works from the collection since they were shown at The Metropolitan Museum of Art in 1973.

OPENING EXHIBITION

From Botany to Bouquets: Flowers in Northern Art

January 31 through May 31, 1999

This exhibition brings together a magnificent group of sixteenthand seventeenth-century flower still-life paintings by such artists as Ambrosius Bosschaert the Elder, Jan Brueghel the Elder, Jan Davidsz. de Heem, and Jan van Huysum. These Dutch artists were highly esteemed for the extraordinary realism of their works and for their ability to convey the delicacy of blossoms, the organic rhythms of stems and leaves, and the varied colors and textures of each and every plant. Their works were also valued for the philosophical issues they raised about the relationship of art to nature, to poetry, and to life itself. Botanical treatises, manuscripts, and watercolors from both private and public collections present the story underlying the origins of flower painting.

This is the second in a series of three exhibitions for the Dutch Cabinet Galleries sponsored by Shell Oil Company.

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

Edo: Art in Japan 1615–1868

Through February 15, 1999 East Building, upper level, mezzanine, and north bridge

Nearly three hundred painted scrolls and screens, costumes, armor, sculpture, ceramics, lacquer, and woodblock prints from the Edo period (1615–1868), a time of unprecedented peace and prosperity in Japan, are on loan from Japanese private and public collections. Many of the works have never before left Japan, and fortyseven have been designated as National Treasures, Important Cultural Properties, or Important Art Objects by the government of Japan. Touch-screen computers adjacent to the exhibition present a new virtual reality multi-media program, Exploring Edo, about life in Edo (present-day Tokyo) during the seventeenth to mid-nineteenth centuries. The program was developed by the National Gallery of Art and NTT.

The exhibition is organized by the National Gallery of Art, Washington, the Agency for Cultural Affairs, Government of Japan, and The Japan Foundation.



Thirty-five rarely exhibited terracotta *bozzetti* from Russia's State Hermitage Museum are presented in this exhibition. Fourteen artists are included, providing a rare opportunity to see works by many masters of seventeenth- and early eighteenthcentury Italian sculpture, including Gian Lorenzo Bernini and Alessandro Algardi. Love and War: A Manual for Life in the Late Middle Ages

Through January 31, 1999 East Building, ground level northwest

The Housebook Master was one of the most delightful artists of the late Middle Ages. Rarely seen by the public in this century, the South German *Housebook* manuscript still belongs to the family of the Princes of Waldburg-Wolfegg. This exhibition of more than one hundred works is organized around various secular themes of medieval life. It presents drawings from The Housebook as well as the master's drypoints from the Rijksprentenkabinet, Riiksmuseum, Amsterdam; rare Gothic prints and drawings from the National Gallery of Art; and related artistic and utilitarian objec ts from other American collections.




