CLOSING EXHIBITION

The Golden Age of Chinese Archaeology: Celebrated Discoveries from The People's Republic of China

through January 2, 2000 East Building, mezzanine northeast

This landmark exhibition of recent archaeological discoveries in China for the last forty years provides a unique opportunity to see masterpieces dating from the Neolithic through the Early Imperial Periods (5000 BC to the tenth century AD). More than two hundred works are presented in the show, and most were excavated between the late 1970s and the present, a period considered by many scholars to be the "golden age of Chinese archaeology." Objects include painted pottery, ritual bronze vessels, lacquer works, jade body shrouds, sculpture, and gold and silver wares. New ideas in the field of Chinese archaeology are explored, providing different perspectives on early Chinese civilization and art.

A twenty-minute film, produced by the National Gallery of Art and narrated by author Amy Tan, features recent excavations and explains how they have changed our understanding of ancient China. The film is shown continuously in a theater adjacent to the exhibition.

Carleton Watkins: The Art of Perception

February 20 through May 7, 2000 West Building, main floor galleries

The first major exhibition in twenty years of works by the celebrated nineteenth-century American photographer Carleton Watkins (1829–1916) includes magnificent mammoth-plate prints, as well as panoramic and stereo format photographs, including his best-known studies of Yosemite and other celebrated works from California, Washington, and Oregon from the late 1850s through the early 1890s.

The exhibition is organized by the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, in association with The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, and with special cooperation from the Huntington Library and Art Gallery, San Marino, California. Martin Johnson Heade

Approximately seventy paintings by American painter Martin Johnson Heade (1819–1904), one of the most inventive and creative artists of the nineteenth century, will be presented in the first comprehensive display of his art since 1969. Included are Heade's finest works, divided into six groups, each devoted to one of the artist's key themes in the areas of landscape, still life, and marine painting.

An Enduring Legacy: Masterpieces from the Collection of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mellon

Highlights from the gifts and bequests of Paul Mellon (1907-1999), one of the Gallery's founding benefactors, will celebrate the legacy of his generosity to the National Gallery of Art. Approximately ninety works including French, British, and American paintings, sculpture, drawings, watercolors, and prints are on view. A section of the exhibition is devoted to the work of Edgar Degas, and will include such masterpieces as Little Dancer Fourteen Years Old (both wax and plaster versions) and a selection of the master's unique small sculpture in wax of bathers, dancers, and horses and riders, along with the monumental painting Scene from the Steeplechase: The Fallen Jockey.

Johannes Vermeer: The Art of Painting

through February 6, 2000 Main Floor gallery 51

Visitors to the National Gallery of Art will have the extraordinary opportunity to see Johannes Vermeer's (1632–1675) masterpiece *The Art of Painting* (c. 1666–1667), one of the great treasures in the collection of the Kunsthistorisches Museum in Vienna. This large painting was important to Vermeer, and he kept it in his possession throughout his lifetime. The Art of Painting is an allegorical image that explores the complex relationship between art and history and the importance of the artist's role in society. It will be installed with four paintings from the Gallery's permanent collection: Vermeer's Woman Holding a Balance (c. 1664), A Lady Writing (c. 1665), Girl with the Red Hat (c. 1665/1666), and Girl with a Flute (probably 1665/1670, attributed to Vermeer).

From Schongauer to Holbein: Master **Drawings from Basel and Berlin**

This exhibition of masterworks created by many of the greatest Renaissance artists in Germany and Switzerland has been selected from two of the foremost collections of these drawings in the world, the great art museums in Berlin and Basel.

Dating from 1465 to 1545, nearly 200 drawings in a rich variety of color, style, and subject matter represent major groups by the finest artists, providing mini-surveys of such masters as Martin Schongauer, Hans Holbein the Elder, Matthias Grünewald, Hans Baldung Grien, Albrecht Altdorfer, Urs Graf, and Hans Holbein the Younger, as well as the towering artistic figure of Albrecht Dürer.


The first major survey of the entire career of Tilman Riemenschneider (active in Würzburg, Germany, from 1483 to 1531) in almost seventy vears presents the full range of his artistic production in wood, stone, and alabaster. Among the fifty works on view are several altarpieces and works created for private devotion. The exhibition also contains a selection of sculpture by such predecessors and contemporaries as Niklaus Gerhaert von Leiden and Veit Stoss.

The Drawings of **Annibale Carracci**

through January 9, 2000 West Building, main floor galleries

The first monographic exhibition devoted to the work of Annibale Carracci (1560–1609), one of the greatest draftsmen of all time, celebrates his naturalism, imagination, and wide range of subject matter. A selection of ninety-five of the master's best drawings includes grand compositions, quick jottings, individual figure studies, landscapes, and genre scenes. The centerpiece of the exhibition is a spectacular full-scale, eleven-foot-square cartoon for the painting The Triumph of Bacchus and Ariadne from Carracci's most important commission, the decoration of the ceiling of the Farnese Gallery in Rome (1597–1600). This cartoon has never before been exhibited outside its home museum in Urbino, Italy.

Max Weber (American, 1881–1961) was one of the first artists to carry the modernist revolution from Europe to the United States. This installation focuses on his prints, paintings, and drawings in the Gallery's collection, including the monumental paintings Interior of the Fourth Dimension (1913), a gift of Natalie Davis Spingarn, and Rush Hour, New York (1915), a gift of the Avalon Foundation. Also included will be a selection of jewel-like relief prints, many chosen from recent gifts and mised gifts to the Gallery from Jack and Margrit Vanderryn. Such prints reveal brilliant, expressive effects, as in three unique impressions of Crouching Nude (1919/1920), all printed from the same block, but showing extraordinary variation.

Brassaï: The Eye of Paris

through January 16, 2000 West Building, ground floor galleries

This retrospective exhibition celebrates the centenary of the birth of Brassaï (born Gyula Halász on September 9, 1899, in Brasso, Transylvania) with approximately 115 works by an artist best known for the photographs he made of Paris at night in the early 1930s. His photographs of the city streets reveal a remarkable sensitivity to light and atmosphere. His studies of Parisian night life—its cafés, theaters, and restaurants—as well as his portraits show the artist's exceptional ability to select the moment when gesture and expression succinctly summarize a character and place. It is the first exhibition since Brassaï's death in 1984 to fully examine his career. The exhibition is organized by




