Raphael and His Circle: Drawings from Windsor Castle

through July 23, 2000 East Building, mezzanine northwest

From the collection of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, more than sixty drawings by Raphael (1483-1520) and his circle provide an overview of the short career of one of Western art's most influential talents. Raphael developed principles of composition, types of figure drawing, and systems of workshop collaboration that set the standards for much of the next four centuries. Works by artists who helped form his style, such as Perugino and Luca Signorelli, precede twenty-one masterworks by Raphael. Drawings by Raphael's principal assistants and followers show how his ideas were developed in distinctive ways and how his style spread throughout Italy.



Prints and Proofs by Richard Diebenkorn A selection of outstanding prints by this artist includes both figurative works and abstractions printed over four decades at Crown Point Press, Gemini G.E.L., and Tamarind Lithography Workshop. Among these works are hand-touched proofs showing the development of the artist's images.
