
Modern Art and America: Alfred Stieglitz and His New York Galleries


January 28 through April 22, 2001 West Building

This exhibition of 190 paintings, sculptures, photographs, and works on paper is the first to explore fully Alfred Stieglitz's seminal role in the development of modern art in America, as photographer, publisher, and gallery director. It examines the lively and fertile exchange of art and ideas that Stieglitz promoted through a selection of the most significant works exhibited at his New York galleries: 291 (1908-1917), the Intimate Gallery (1925-1929), and An American Place (1929-1946). The first section focuses on Stieglitz's introduction of European modern art to America at 291 and includes the first works shown in the United States by such key artists as Paul Cézanne, Henri Matisse, and Pablo Picasso. Also featured here will be two partial reconstructions of Stieglitz's 1914 exhibits of African art and Constantin Brancusi's sculpture. The second section considers the formation of a distinctively American form of modernism. It begins by exploring the rich experimentation in both materials and subject matter that Stieglitz fostered in the 1920s and concludes with monographic presentations of masterworks shown at his last gallery, An American Place, by the circle of artists known as the "Seven Americans": Charles Demuth, Arthur Dove, Marsden Hartley, John Marin, Georgia O'Keeffe, Paul Strand, and Stieglitz himself.

PERMANENT COLLECTION

Italian Cabinet Galleries

West Building

The National Gallery recently opened three intimately scaled galleries designed to evoke the collection in an Italian Renaissance palace or villa. Paintings and precious objects like the ones exhibited here were kept and enjoyed in the private chambers of Italian princes, humanists, and well-to-do merchants. In these rooms, known as cabinets or studioli (studies), Renaissance collectors expressed their individual tastes and interests through the rare and beautiful objects they chose to display. Paintings, bronze statuettes and plaquettes, rock crystal vessels, and brightly decorated ceramics from the Gallery's permanent collection reveal the Renaissance fascination with classical Greece and Rome, as collectors sought out rare antiquities and commissioned works incorporating heroes and motifs from the ancient world.





Art for the Nation: Collecting for a New Century

Through February 4, 2001 West Building

On view are 140 of the most outstanding acquisitions since the Gallery's 50th anniversary exhibition in 1991. Paintings, sculpture, and works on paper range in date from about 1480 to 1996. A substantial representation of Renaissance, seventeenth-century Dutch,

and nineteenth-century American and French painting includes works by Thomas Cole, Edgar Degas, Vincent van Gogh, Winslow Homer, Henri Matisse, Claude Monet, Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, and Jasper Johns. Among the works on paper are drawings by Botticelli, Albrecht Dürer, Anthony van Dyck, Jean-Honoré Fragonard, Caspar David Friedrich, Jean-Auguste-Dominique Ingres, Raphael, and Odilon Redon.

Art Nouveau. 1890-1914

Through January 28, 2001 East Building

This largest and most comprehensive exhibition on Art Nouveau ever organized presents one of the most innovative and exuberant of all modern art styles. More than 350 masterpieces in painting, sculpture, graphics, glass, ceramics, textiles, furniture, jewelry, and architecture are featured, including a Paris Métropolitain entrance by Hector Guimard, a Glasgow luncheon room designed by Charles Rennie Mackintosh, and a double parlor from a Turin villa by Agostino Lauro. The two rooms are among the unique features of the Washington venue. An overview of highlights from the Paris World's Fair of 1900 is followed by sections presenting sources of the new style and examples from eight cities in which Art Nouveau flourished: Paris, Brussels, Glasgow, Vienna, Munich, Turin, New York, and Chicago.

Small Northern European Portraits from The Walters Art **Gallery, Baltimore**

Through February 19, 2001 West Building


Selected primarily from the collection of the Walters Art Gallery, Baltimore, this exhibition focuses on small-scale portraits made in northern Europe between the midfifteenth and late seventeenth centuries. In addition to the works from the Walters Art Gallery, the exhibition includes portraits from the National Gallery of Art's permanent collection as well as loans from other public and private collections.

On view are forty-three works ranging from opaque watercolors to gilded silver medals and bronze statuettes. They are organized into four themes, representing the most important aspects of small-scale portraiture from this period: devotional portraits, political portraits, English and French miniatures, and Dutch intimate portraits.

Prints Abound: Paris in the 1890s, From the **Collections of Virginia** and Ira Jackson and the National Gallery of Art

Through February 25, 2001 East Building

More than 110 original prints for posters, portfolios, illustrated books and journals, song sheets and music primers represent the many maniestations of artists' printed images in late nineteenth-century France. Fourteen important drawings and watercolors related to prints in the exhibition are also on display.

Primarily selected from the Virginia and Ira Jackson Collection, the exhibition features works by twenty-five artists, including Pierre Bonnard, Edouard Vuillard, Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, and Paul Gauguin. Bonnard's graphic works are shown in depth, including his magnificent four-panel folding screen, Promenade des nourrices, and a delightful music primer for children, Petit solfège illustré. In addition to published editions of the music primer, five of the Jacksons' marvelous preparatory watercolors for the book are also on view.

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
