CONTINUING EXHIBITION

Drawing on America's Past: Folk Art, **Modernism**, and the **Index of American** Design

Through March 2, 2003 West Building, central gallery

The Index of American Design was one of the most highly regarded of the 1930s New Deal art projects. Its aim was to compile and eventually publish a pictorial archive of decorative, folk, and popular arts made in America from the time of European settlement to about 1900. Each object was recorded in a meticulous watercolor rendering. This exhibition commemorates the sixtieth anniversary of the Gallery's acquisition of the Index of American Design, and explores issues of folk art and national identity. The installation presents approximately eighty of the finest watercolor renderings from the Index, along with a selection of approximately forty of the original artifacts they represent, including quilts, weather vanes, toys, carousel animals, stoneware, and cigar-store figures.

Willem de Kooning: **Tracing the Figure**

Through January 5, 2003 East Building, concourse level

Willem de Kooning (1904–1997) was one of the great proponents of abstract expressionism, the movement that brought international acclaim to postwar American art. Bringing together more than sixty of the most beautiful works on paper that de Kooning executed between 1938 and 1955, this exhibition is the first to examine his pioneering drawings of the female form. The artist's renowned, provocative depictions of women demonstrate his ability to shift between figurative and abstract modes. De Kooning's drawings were at the center of his artistic process throughout his lengthy and prolific career.

"Willem de Kooning: Tracing the Figure" has been organized by the Museum of Contemporary Art, Los Angeles.

OPENING EXHIBITION

Thomas Gainsborough, 1727-1788

February 9–May 11, 2003 West Building

Thomas Gainsborough, a British painter and draftsman, is considered one of the great masters of eighteenth-century portraiture and landscape painting. Consisting of approximately sixty-six paintings and thirty-two works on paper, this exhibition is the first comprehensive presentation of Gainsborough's art in more than twenty years, and the first Gainsborough exhibition of its kind in America. This major gathering of the artist's finest works, including portraits characterized by the refined grace of the figures, Gainsborough's distinctive poetic landscape paintings, and his "fancy pictures" of scenes of the rural poor, illustrates the full range and exceptional richness of his achievement.

OPENING EXHIBITION

Édouard Vuillard

January 19–April 20, 2003 West Building

The most comprehensive exhibition ever devoted to the work of Édouard Vuillard, the quintessential Parisian artist whose work spans the fin de siècle through the 1930s, has its world premiere at the National Gallery of Art's West Building in January. It includes works that have never been on public display and many that have not been seen for decades. Over two hundred works on view demonstrate the full range of Vuillard's (1868–1940) prolific career and his embrace of unconventional media. In addition to his luminous paintings, the exhibition includes innovative folding screens, theater programs, prints, drawings, photographs, and ceramics. One exhibition highlight is the reunion of the Public Gardens (1894), a series of decorative panels not seen together publicly since 1906, and dispersed at auction in 1929. Édouard Vuillard travels to Montreal, Paris, and London.



PERMANENT COLLECTION

New Sculpture Galleries

West Building, ground floor

The new sculpture galleries present more than nine hundred works of art, including masterpieces of sculpture from the Middle Ages through the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries; eighteenth-century French decorative arts; and major collections of Renaissance medals and plaquettes, as well as Chinese porcelains. Encompassing approximately 24,000 square feet, the new galleries occupy the entire northwest quadrant of the West Building ground floor.

Highlights of the installation include Leone Battista Alberti's bronze *Self-Portrait* plaque (c. 1435); a distinguished group of Italian Renaissance bronze statuettes, beautifully enhanced by works on loan from the Robert H. Smith Collection: Honoré Daumier's entire bronze sculptural oeuvre, including all thirty-six of his caricatures of French government officials; a selection of sculptures made by Auguste Rodin for his American patrons, among them his life-size plaster The Age of Bronze (modeled 1875–1876, cast 1898); and the world's largest group of original wax and mixed-media sculptures by Edgar Degas.

Intimate galleries have been designed to display other small works of art, including medals and plaquettes; Chinese porcelains from the Widener Collection, primarily from the Qing Dynasty

of the seventeenth to nineteenth centuries; Renaissance maiolica (brilliantly painted tin glazed earthenware); a pair of early sixteenth-century Florentine Annunciation stained glass windows; the Gallery's newly acquired Holy Kinship altarpiece, a fifteenth-century German polychromed and gilded wood relief; and furniture, church vessels, and tapestries from the Renaissance and the Middle Ages, including the twelfth-century Chalice of the Abbot Suger of Saint-Denis, the pièce de résistance of the Gallery's collection of medieval art, as well as the sixteenth-century Flemish tapestry The Triumph of Christ (the "Mazarin Tapestry").

The ten-minute video Introduction to Sculpture runs continuously from 12:30 to 4:30 every day in the West Building lecture hall, with occasional interruptions for other events, through January 31, 2003.

The sculpture galleries' renovation project was supported in part by a generous grant from the Richard King Mellon Foundation in honor of Paul Mellon.

Renaissance Bronzes from the Robert H. **Smith Collection**

Through February 17, 2003 West Building, sculpture galleries

Bronze sculpture of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries gave visible expression to the Renaissance admiration for the world of classical antiquity. The gods, goddesses, and heroes of ancient Greece and Rome, in fierce struggle or at graceful rest, found new life in Renaissance bronze statuettes. Patrons schooled in classical literature energetically collected these works. Renaissance interest in nature also encouraged production of bronzes portraying spirited horses and animals in combat.

The sculptures in this exhibition include fifty bronzes lent from the Robert H. Smith Collection, one of the most important private collections of European bronzes. Most of these sculptures treat subjects inspired by ancient art and mythology. The Smith Collection includes exceptionally fine works by major contemporaries and successors of Michelangelo. Several of the Italian sculptures come from the Florentine studio of Giovanni Bologna, whose bronzes attracted the patronage of the Medici grand dukes and princely courts throughout Europe.

Deceptions and Illusions: Five Centuries of Trompe l'Oeil Painting

Through March 2, 2003 East Building, upper and mezzanine levels

This exhibition constitutes the most comprehensive treatment to date of the phenomenon of trompe l'oeil—a depiction of an object, person, or scene so lifelike that it appears to be real—and illustrates its playful and intellectual nature. With more than one hundred works by masters of the genre, including Samuel van Hoogstraten, Cornelis Gijsbrechts, and Louis-Léopold Boilly in Europe, as well as Charles Willson Peale, William Harnett, and John Frederick Peto in America, the exhibition explores the art of trompe l'oeil from its origins in classical antiquity to its impact on twentieth-century artists, including René Magritte, Jasper Johns, and Andy Warhol.

A pioneer of French art cinema, director Marcel L'Herbier (1888-1979) became a leader of the avant garde film movement during the 1920s. This January series includes four of L'Herbier's best known early films, all of which are recent archival restorations. These four silent films are accompanied by live musical scores for piano and other instruments.

Jean Grémillon


