

Palace and Mosque: Islamic Art from the Victoria and Albert Museum

July 18, 2004 – February 6, 2005 East Building, Upper Level

Assembled over the past 150 years, the Islamic art collection of the Victoria and Albert Museum (v&A) in London is one of the most renowned in the world. The closing of the v&A's Islamic galleries for renovation provides a unique opportunity to present an exhibition that highlights the breadth and depth of this extraordinary collection. Selected from aproximately 10,000 objects, Palace and Mosque conveys the richness and complexity of Islamic art through more than one hundred works representing a full range of the decorative arts: ceramics, textiles, carpets, ivories, glass, metalwork, and woodwork.

The exhibition is organized in thematic sections. "The Written Word" explores the widespread influence of calligraphy, considered the noblest form of Islamic art because of its association with the Qur'an. "Courts and Courtiers" features the elegant, poetic works of art made for the ruling elite, with particular emphasis on the sixteenth- and seventeenth-century courts of the Safavid dynasty in Iran and the Ottoman dynasty that ruled from Istanbul. "Mosques, Shrines, and Churches" includes a magnificent twenty-three-foot-high pulpit (*minbar*) made for a mosque in Cairo in the fifteenth century, as well as works of art made for Christian communities in the Middle East. "Artistic Exchange" presents works of Islamic, European, and Asian manufacture that demonstrate the central role of the Middle East in the exchange of artistic and cultural ideas between East and West.



CONTINUING EXHIBITION

American Masters from Bingham to Eakins: The John Wilmerding Collection

Through October 10, 2004 East Building, Mezzanine

John Wilmerding, a respected and widely known authority on American art, is donating this collection-considered one of the most important private collections of nineteenth-century American art—to the National Gallery. This exhibition of fifty-one works by twenty-six artists includes paintings by such masters as George Caleb Bingham, Frederic Edwin Church, Thomas Eakins, Alvan Fisher, William Stanley Haseltine, Martin Johnson Heade, Fitz Hugh Lane, John Marin, John Frederick Peto, and William Trost Richards. The works represent four decades of collecting in an area of particular scholarly interest to Wilmerding, a former deputy director of the National Gallery of Art and currently the Christopher Binyon Sarofim '86 Professor in American Art at Princeton University.

The exhibition showcases a variety of American works of art such as landscapes, marine paintings, portraits, genre scenes, still lifes, and figure paintings. One feature of the exhibition is a group of drawings and watercolors of the scenery of Mount Desert Island, Maine, by artists who worked there from the 1840s until the early twentieth century.

Additional features from the collection include Fitz Hugh Lane's *Stage Rocks and Western Shore of Gloucester Outer Harbor* (1857), a radiant view of sailing vessels on calm water, and a rare genre painting by George Caleb Bingham, *Mississippi Boatman* (1850), which depicts a rugged-looking man guarding cargo on the riverside.

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

Hudson River School Visions: The Landscapes of Sanford R. Gifford

June 27 – September 26, 2004 West Building, Main Floor

The noted American painter Sanford Robinson Gifford (1823–1880) was a master of the atmospheric landscape. This exhibition, featuring more than seventy paintings reflecting the artist's travels in America, Europe, and the Middle East, is the first of its kind in more than thirty years.

Gifford's penchant for radiant light and aerial effects distinguishes his landscapes from the work of his contemporaries and manifests a personal and poetic current that anticipates later trends in American art. Gifford is lauded particularly for his renderings of the Catskill Mountains and the Hudson River, dreamily transfigured or poignantly charged by his distinctive vision.

The exhibition was organized by the National Gallery of Art, Washington, and The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York.

SPECIAL INSTALLATION

Mark Rothko: **The Mural Projects**

On view indefinitely East Building, Concourse

A special installation of works by Mark Rothko (1903–1970), long recognized as one of America's preeminent artists, celebrates the centennial of his birth as well as the twenty-fifth anniversary of the East Building.

A member of the New York School, Rothko is best known for his luminous paintings of the 1950s, which count among some of the most important examples of twentieth-century art. The paintings relate to two mural commissions, the Seagram murals and the Harvard murals, which date from the late 1950s and early 1960s, respectively.

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

Drawings of Town and Country from the **Armand Hammer** Collection

Through November 14, 2004 West Building, Ground Floor

The Armand Hammer collection of old master and modern drawings consists of more than fifty works by some of the great draftsmen of all time, from Leonardo da Vinci and Raphael to Van Gogh and Picasso. With works spanning more than five centuries—from about 1470 to 1940—the collection features a remarkable range of studies and finished compositions drawn in a variety of styles and techniques.

Since their arrival at the National Gallery of Art in 1986, the drawings have been shown in a nearly continuous series of small exhibitions on a variety of themes. Currently on view is a selection of thirteen landscapes, town views, and nature studies by such masters as Albrecht Dürer, François Boucher, Paul Gauguin, and Andrew Wyeth.

CLOSING EXHIBITION

Drawings of Jim Dine

Through August 1, 2004 West Building, Ground Floor

Jim Dine is a consummate draftsman whose images of tools, largescale nudes, self-portraits, and studies from nature and antiquity are among the most accomplished and beautiful drawings of our time. This exhibition, the first major survey of Dine's drawings in over fifteen years, features approximately one hundred of his finest drawings, from about 1970 to the present. Dine's reputation soared during the 1960s when his name became linked with pop art. In the 1970s, however, Dine made a dramatic shift when he embraced a heightened regard for drawing.

This exhibition examines the artist's accomplishment by focusing not only on works that fall under the broad category of works on paper, but also on drawings in a stricter sense of the term: those that rely heavily on line and materials such as pencil, chalk, and charcoal. The exhibition also sheds light on drawing's integral role in Dine's development, and confirms its presence at the core of his artistic expression today.

CLOSING EXHIBITION

The Cubist Paintings of Diego Rivera: **Memory, Politics, Place**

Through July 25, 2004 East Building, Upper Level

Approximately twenty of Rivera's finest cubist works, created when he was working in France and Spain, have been brought together for this exhibition. During a period that coincided with both World War I and the most active period of the Mexican Revolution, Rivera explored themes of identity and place.

Rivera experimented with evocative links between objects, people, and places, often including specific Mexican motifs and references to the cities he inhabited at the time (Paris, Madrid, Mallorca, and Toledo). Many of the works, such as Zapatista Landscape (1915), incorporate objects that serve as emblems of Mexican identity. Another example is the important 1915 painting, No. 9, Nature morte espagnole (Spanish Still Life), donated to the Gallery by the estate of Washington Post publisher Katharine Graham.

CLOSING EXHIBITION

Ancient Maya

Through July 25, 2004 East Building, Mezzanine and Upper Level

In a period of just 150 years from AD 650 to 800, Maya kings and nobles living in the tropical rainforests of southern Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras and Belize, transformed their art, achieving a peak of dramatic expression and naturalism unmatched in the ancient New World. Courtly Art of the Ancient Maya features over 130 masterworks drawn from Mexico, Guatemala, Honduras, Australia, Europe, and the United States.

The exhibition explores the artistic world inside the royal courts of the ancient Maya. Supported by a society of great complexity, the ancient Maya royalty commissioned works of art and architecture to memorialize themselves and ensure their place in history. Objects on view include stone sculptures, ceramics, and masks, all organized around the key themes of life at the Maya court, the divine models of courtly culture, women at court, and the court at war. The exhibition includes important new archaeological discoveries from Palenque, one of the greatest examples of an ancient Maya court known to the twenty-first century.

Courtly Art of the Ancient Maya has been organized by the National Gallery of Art, Washington, and the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco.



Films of Ingmar Bergman

The eminent film and theater director Ingmar Bergman observes his eighty-sixth birthday on July 14. From mid-July through mid-August, the National Gallery of Art joins the American Film Institute Silver Theatre and Cultural Center and the National Museum of Women in the Arts to present a retrospective of thirty-five works by this legendary Swedish auteur, spanning his entire career.

The National Gallery's contribution to the series, opening July 11, concentrates on the period of 1944 through 1960. During this time, Bergman established his international reputation as Europe's premier art director with such works as Sawdust and Tinsel (1953), The Seventh Seal (1957), Wild Strawberries (1957), Smiles of a Summer Night (1958), and The Virgin Spring (1959).

Roy Andersson

A series of three films by Roy Andersson (b. 1943), a former student of Ingmar Bergman at the Swedish Film Institute in Stockholm, showcases this director's unusual visual style-a mixture of surreal and mystical motifs influenced in part by the paintings of Georg Grosz and Otto Dix and the plays of Samuel Beckett and August Strindberg. Andersson's films are shown on August 28 and 29, through the cooperation of the Embassy of Sweden and the Swedish Institute.


The Collection

The National Gallery of Art, one of the world's preeminent museums, was created for the people of the United States of America by a joint resolution of Congress accepting the gift of financier, public servant, and art collector Andrew W. Mellon in 1937. European and American paintings, sculpture, decorative arts, and select works on paper are displayed in the collection galleries and Sculpture Garden, and temporary exhibitions of art from countries and cultures throughout the world are presented on a regular basis.

The Gallery is located on Constitution Avenue between Third and Ninth Streets NW.
