Afghanistan: Hidden Treasures from the National Museum, Kabul

May 25—September 7, 2008 East Building, Mezzanine

Afghanistan's rich cultural heritage is celebrated in this exhibition of extraordinary archaeological treasures from the National Museum of Afghanistan, Kabul. Some 230 objects ranging in date from c. 2000 BC through AD 200 are drawn from four key archaeological sites. They include gold objects from the famed Bactrian Hoard, a two-thousand-year-old treasure cache discovered in 1978 but hidden from view until 2003.

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A landmark of Dutch landscapes, Ferry on a River (1649) by Salomon van Ruvsdael (1603–1670) was acquired in late 2007. Retour à May 1968

May 2008 marks the fortieth anniversary of the historic period now referred to as "May '68." Particularly in France, it was a time of student unrest, activism, boycott, and rebellion that initiated changes in French society felt around the world. A program of four French films during May evokes the exhilaration and the rage that marked May '68, including Philippe Garrel's Les Amants réguliers, Jean-Luc Godard's Tout va bien, and Louis Malle's Milou en mai.

Envisioning Russia: Mosfilm

The largest and most influential film studio in Russia, Mosfilm first opened its doors in Moscow in the early 1920s. From historical epics to

musicals, propaganda films, and enduring classics by such directors as Mikhail Kalatozov, Mikhail Romm, Larisa Shepitko, and Andrei Tarkovsky, Mosfilm's contributions to film history have been beyond compare. Ten feature films from the 1920s through the 1950s will be presented in June. Part two of the retrospective in July will include ten films from the 1960s through the present day.

Gabriel Figueroa: Master of Light and Shade

The premier cinematographer of Mexico's golden age of cinema. Gabriel Figueroa (1907–1997) played a key role in establishing that nation's lasting visual legacy. His unique style, based on the principle of "curvilinear perspective," merged the latest Hollywood technique with the pictorial art of Mexican muralists. The series includes six new 35 mm prints from Filmoteca de la UNAM in Mexico.

I Am a Cat

Natsume Sõseki's satirical Japanese novel I Am a Cat was the inspiration for Kon Ichikawa's 1975 film starring revered Japanese stage and film actor Tatsuya Nakadai as a teacher during the Meiji period. Following the screening, Tatsuya Nakadai will be interviewed in person.

Julius Caesar

One of the finest Hollywood studio renditions of Shakespeare ever, Joseph L. Mankiewicz's Julius Caesar features not only a stellar cast, but also a sensitive reading of the text that preserves the play's dramatic rhythms.
