Among the artists represented are Patrick Henry Bruce, Stuart Davis, Charles Demuth, Arthur Dove, Marcel Duchamp, Marsden Hartley, Stanton Macdonald-Wright, John Marin, Georgia O'Keeffe, Man Ray, Morton Schamberg, Charles Sheeler, Joseph Stella, John Storrs, and Max Weber. All works are from the collection of Deborah and Ed Shein, which is distinguished by its remarkable quality and rigorous focus on early American modernism.

Edvard Munch: Master Prints

July 31–October 31, 2010 East Building, Mezzanine

Edvard Munch's greatest artistic legacy is his series of major prints depicting the basic human themes of attraction, love, and union; jealousy and separation; birth and awakening; and anxiety and death. The central ideas and accomplishments of Munch (1863-1944) are illuminated in an exhibition that brings together sixty of his rare color prints and hand-colored variations of these prints. His stylistic approach to these themes involved transforming ideas into an evocative image and exploring the image through numerous variations over a lifetime. Major loans from two of the world's finest private collections will be joined by exquisite works from the Gallery's own collection.

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

German Master Drawings from the Wolfgang Ratjen Collection, 1580-1900

Through November 28, 2010 West Building, Ground Floor

In 2007, the Gallery acquired 120 outstanding German drawings from the collection assembled by Wolfgang Ratjen (1943-1997). All of the drawings are presented in this exhibition, which includes rare examples by Hans von Aachen and Adam Elsheimer; studies for soaring religious ceilings and altarpieces by some of the greatest South German artists, such as Cosmas Damian Asam and Matthäus Günther; new visions of landscape in watercolors by Johann Georg von Dillis and Caspar David Friedrich; architectural designs by Karl Schinkel and Rudolf von Alt; and an exciting group of realist works by Adolph Menzel and Max Liebermann.

A parallel exhibition of eightytwo Gallery drawings from the same period demonstrates how these two collections balance and reinforce each other to give an outstanding view of German art through the centuries.

Beat Memories: The Photographs of Allen Ginsberg

Through September 6, 2010 West Building, Ground Floor

The first scholarly exhibition of American poet Allen Ginsberg's photographs explores all facets of his work in photography. Some eighty works on display range from Ginsberg's portraits of Beat writers Jack Kerouac and William S. Burroughs from the 1950s to his later photographs of the Beats and other friends made in the 1980s and 1990s. His pictures are more than historical documents. The same ideas that informed his poetry—an intense observation of the world, a deep appreciation of the beauty of the vernacular, a celebration of the

From Impressionism to Modernism: The **Chester Dale Collection**

Wall Street investor Chester Dale's 1962 bequest made the National Gallery of Art one of the leading North America repositories of French art of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. This unprecedented exhibition brings together eighty-three of the finest French and American paintings that Dale and his wife Maud, an artist and critic, assembled largely from the 1920s through the 1950s.

The second in a series of East Building exhibitions focusing on contemporary art and its roots offers a rare look at the black-on-black paintings that Rothko made in 1964 in connection with his work on a chapel for the Menil Collection in Houston. A recording of Rothko Chapel (1971), the haunting music that Morton Feldman originally composed for that space, accompanies the exhibition.


Film and Reality in the 1930s

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
