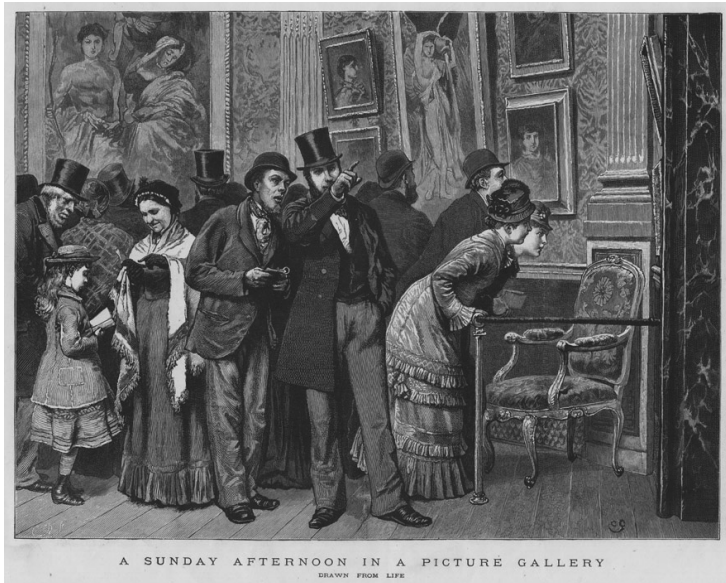

Picturing the Victorians: British Photographs and Reproductive Prints from the Department of Image Collections

Specialized engravers created prints after significant works of art as early as the 1500s. Developments in printmaking and photography in the nineteenth century revolutionized this labor-intensive practice, making available a wide range of art reproductions in Victorian England. This exhibition presents twenty-two rare photographs and reproductive prints documenting the work of middle to late Victorian artists, including John Everett Millais, Sir Edward Coley Burne-Jones, George Frederick Watts, and Sir Lawrence Alma-Tadema.

American Modernism: The Shein Collection

This exhibition explores the advent of modernism a century ago through twenty important paintings, sculptures, and drawings by the first-generation American avant-garde. All works are from the collection of Deborah and Ed Shein, which is distinguished by its remarkable quality and rigorous focus on early American modernism.

Arcimboldo, 1526–1593: Nature and Fantasy

Through January 9, 2011
East Building, Mezzanine

Sixteen examples of the composite heads painted by Giuseppe Arcimboldo, bizarre but with scientifically accurate components, are featured in their first appearance in the United States. The unusual heads are composed of plants, animals, and other objects that relate to the figure represented. Additional works—including drawings by Leonardo and Dürer, small bronzes, illustrated books and manuscripts, and ceramics—provide a context for Arcimboldo's fantastic inventions, revealing his debt to physiognomic studies and the burgeoning natural sciences.

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

The Pre-Raphaelite Lens: British Photography and Painting, 1848–1875

Through January 30, 2011
West Building, Ground Floor

In the first exhibition to examine the rich interaction between mid-nineteenth-century British photography and Pre-Raphaelite painting, some one hundred photographs and twenty paintings and watercolors by leading artists such as Julia Margaret Cameron, Lewis Carroll, John Everett Millais, and Dante Gabriel Rossetti showcase how the two mediums influenced each other. Searching for new ways to represent the natural world and the human form and to communicate stories, photographers and Pre-Raphaelite painters shattered traditional approaches to picture making.

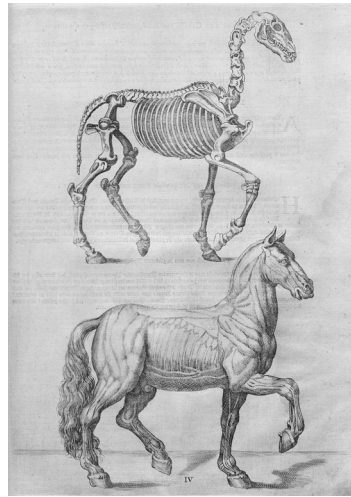

The Body Inside and Out: Anatomical Literature and Art Theory

Through January 23, 2011
West Building, Ground Floor,
Gallery G21

This installation includes a selection of anatomy books, treatises on proportion, and artists' manuals produced throughout Europe between the sixteenth and nineteenth centuries, showing how the study of anatomy was incorporated into the instruction of the visual arts. During the Renaissance many painters and sculptors, including Leonardo and Michelangelo, worked with anatomists to improve their work. From this grew a more scientific approach to the rendering of figures and a greater proportion as the ideal of truth and beauty.

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

From Impressionism to Modernism: The Chester Dale Collection

Through January 2, 2012

Chester Dale's magnificent bequest to the National Gallery of Art in 1962 included one of the most important collections of French painting from the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. This special exhibition, the first in forty-five years to explore the extraordinary legacy left to the nation by this passionate collector, features some eighty-three of his finest French and American paintings. Among the masterpieces on view are Renoir's *A Girl with a Watering Can* (1876) and Picasso's *Family of Saltimbanques* (1905).

CONTINUING EXHIBITION

German Master Drawings from the Wolfgang Ratjen Collection, 1580–1900

Through January 2, 2011
West Building, Ground Floor

This exhibition represents the first time that 120 stunning German watercolors and drawings from the Wolfgang Ratjen Collection—acquired by the Gallery in 2007—are on view to the public. The works include exceptionally rare examples encompassing sixteenth-century mannerism, the seventeenth-century baroque, the eighteenth-century rococo, early nineteenth-century romanticism, and late nineteenth-century realism. With the acquisition of this collection, the Gallery possesses the finest and most thorough portrayal of the best in German draftsmanship outside Europe.

A parallel exhibition of eighty-two Gallery drawings from the same period demonstrates how these two collections balance and reinforce each other to offer an outstanding view of German art through the centuries.

A holiday music and film event features a 1923 adaptation of the Charles Dickens classic accompanied by an ensemble of strings, bells, and voice.

Dante's Inferno, The Brotherhood, and Dreamchild

In association with *The Pre-Raphaelite Lens: British Photography and Painting, 1848–1875*, Ken Russell's 1967 film *Dante's Inferno* on the life of Dante Gabriel Rossetti is screened along with *Dreamchild*, a fictional portrayal of Lewis Carroll's friendship with Alice Liddell, and two episodes from the BBC series *The Brotherhood*.

Force of Evil

A restored print of the classic film noir *Force of Evil* is screened celebrating the one-hundredth anniversary of the birth of its writer and director Abraham Polonsky, with an introduction by scholar Rebecca Prime.

Harun Farocki: Essays

A series that includes two recent essays by German artist and writer Farocki, his best-known feature, as well as the artist's short introduction to the working methods of his mentors Straub and Huillet, introduce the work of a key European media artist whose films are still relatively unknown in the United States.

Iris Barry and American Modernism

In conjunction with the American Modernism symposium, a program of short films—replicating a groundbreaking 1934 event assembled by New York critic and curator Iris Barry, founder of the film department at the Museum of Modern Art—includes avant-garde, animated, and narrative works.

Julien Duvivier: The Grand Artisan

French director Duvivier (1896–1967), whose midcentury films have become linked with "poetic realism," is perhaps the least familiar of the classical directors who exemplified European cinema prior to the 1960s. This series includes ten works from the silent era to the late 1950s.

The Last Command with Alloy Orchestra

One of Josef von Sternberg's most complex works of the silent cinema, *The Last Command* stars the German thespian Emil Jannings as an actor playing a Russian general in a Hollywood movie. The Alloy Orchestra has composed a new score to be performed live with the film.

Polanski and the Łódź Film School

During the late 1950s Roman Polanski made a number of short films, most of them completed at the Łódź Film School, Poland's esteemed national film, television, and theater conservatory. Surreal scenarios and absurdist comedies are accompanied by live music.

Revolución

Consisting of ten short stories by ten filmmakers, the new feature *Revolución* is a reflection on the legacy of the Mexican Revolution viewed a century later and a panorama of the current state of filmmaking in Mexico.

Straub and Huillet: The Work and Reaches of Creation

Artists Jean-Marie Straub and the late Danièle Huillet created an eccentric and personal cinematic style that sought to enliven classic literature and obscure texts. In addition to three recent short films and the well-known feature *Class Relations*, the program includes two works on Straub and Huillet's methods as witnessed by filmmakers Harun Farocki and Pedro Costa.

Admission to the Gallery, its Sculpture Garden, and its activities is free.

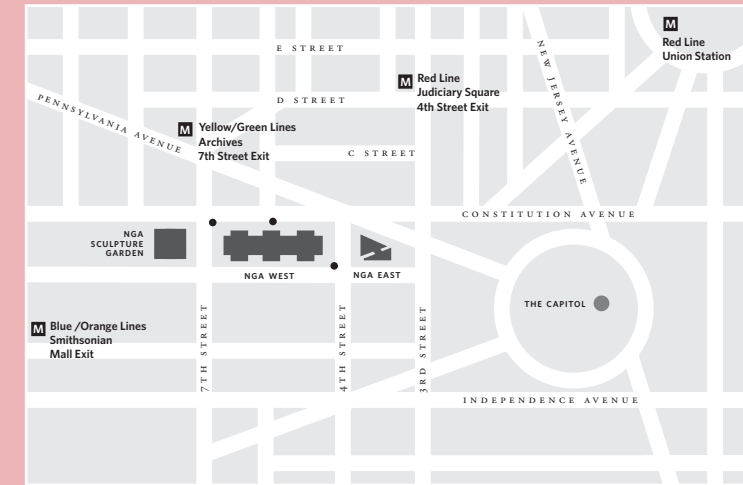
Security Check

No parcels larger than 17 x 26 inches are accepted in the checkrooms. Suitcases are permitted but must be x-rayed at the East or West Building entrances on Fourth Street before being accepted in the checkrooms.

The Collection

Masterworks by renowned European and American artists, including the only painting by Leonardo da Vinci in the Americas and the largest mobile ever created by Alexander Calder, await visitors to the National Gallery of Art, one of the world's preeminent art museums. The Gallery's collection of paintings, drawings, prints, photographs, sculpture, medals, and decorative arts traces the development of Western art from the Middle Ages to the present. The Gallery was created for the people of the United States of America by a joint resolution of Congress accepting the gift of Andrew W. Mellon in 1937.

The Gallery's campus includes the original neoclassical West Building designed by John Russell Pope, which is linked underground to the modern East Building designed by I.M. Pei, and the verdant 6.1-acre Sculpture Garden. Temporary exhibitions span the world and the history of art.
