

# Picasso's Drawings, 1890–1921: Reinventing Tradition

Through May 6 West Building, Ground Floor

Pablo Picasso (1881–1973) is considered by many to be the greatest draftsman of the twentieth century. Through some sixty-five works, the exhibition presents the dazzling development of Picasso's drawings over a thirty-year period, from the precocious academic exercises of his youth to his radical innovations of cubism and collage. The selection focuses on major examples borrowed from American and European collections.

## Colorful Realm: Japanese Bird-and-Flower Paintings by Itō Jakuchū (1716–1800)

March 30—April 29 West Building, Central Gallery

Itō Jakuchū's thirty-scroll *Colorful Realm of Living Beings* (J. *Dōshoku sai-e*; c. 1757–1766) is acknowledged as one of the greatest achievements in the history of Japanese nature painting. A wealthy wholesaler and talented painter, Jakuchū is the most recognized artist of Japan's premodern era and *Colorful Realm* is his masterpiece. Applying sophisticated chromatic effects, he masterfully rendered the richly symbolic world in which he moved.

This exhibition marks the centennial of Japan's gift of cherry trees to Washington, and the first time this renowned cultural treasure—generously lent by the Imperial Household Agency—has been displayed in its entirety outside of Japan.

## Civic Pride: Group Portraits from Amsterdam

This special installation will feature two large-scale group portraits by artists Govert Flinck (1615–1660) and Bartholomeus van der Helst (1613-1670), depicting the governors of the Kloveniersdoelen, the building where one of three main Amsterdam militia companies held their meetings. These works, painted during the height of the Dutch Golden Age, bring to the Gallery a style of painting rarely seen outside the Netherlands and are accompanied by a brochure (available in April) that explains the history and significance of this painting style as well as the importance of each portrait.

# **Mark Rothko: Seagram Murals**

As the world's most important repository and study center of Rothko's art, the Gallery has installed three dramatic murals related to Rothko's renowned commission to decorate a dining room in the Seagram Building's Four Seasons restaurant in 1958. He made some thirty paintings for the space, but his doubts as to whether a luxury restaurant was the appropriate venue for his art ultimately led to his withdrawal from the project.

## **Antico: The Golden Age** of Renaissance Bronzes

Through April 8 East Building, Ground Floor

For the first time in the United States, an exhibition is devoted to the Mantuan sculptor and goldsmith Pier Jacopo Alari Bonacolsi, known as Antico (c. 1455-1528) for his expertise in classical antiquity. Enlivened with gilding and silvering, his exquisite bronze reductions of ancient Roman sculptures were created just after the rediscovery of the original antiquities during the Renaissance. Antico's bronzes are so rare that the nearly forty works in this exhibition—including medals, reliefs, busts, and the renowned statuettes—constitute more than


