Film Programs

East Building Auditorium (eba)

Michelangelo Antonioni Centenary

A program of the early Italian films of Antonioni, shown on the occasion of the centenary of his birth, includes screenings of *La Notte* (1961), *L'Eclisse* (1962), and *Red Desert* (1964), plus a selection of short films.

Aleksei Guerman: War and Remembrance

Russian filmmaker Aleksei Guerman (born 1938) enjoys a reputation in Europe as one of the leading stylists of contemporary cinema. His portrayal of moments of historical consequence in Russian history, coupled with his unconventional approach, has given his work a unique position. His latest film, to be released this year, is an adaptation of Arkady and Boris Strugatsky's *Hard to Be a God.*

El Velador

Acclaimed Mexican filmmaker Natalia Almada's artfully composed documentary unfolds through the daily rhythms of a *velador* (caretaker) at a cemetery that houses the bodies of notorious Mexican drug lords. Ciné-Concert: Gustav Machatý's *Erotikon*

A performance of Gustav Machaty's 1929 legendary silent film, accompanied by pianist Ben Model, is introduced by Andrea Rousova, curator of contemporary art, National Gallery in Prague.

Miloš Forman: Lives of an Artist

Distinguished leader of the Czech new wave and celebrated Hollywood director Milo's Forman (born 1932) is honored with a series of his early works on the occasion of his eightieth birthday. Film historian Michal Bregant, director of the Czech Film Archive in Prague, introduces each program.

A Sense of Place: František Vlácil

Czech artist and filmmaker František Vlácil (1924–1999) possessed a keen sense of period and place, and a painter's eye for telling detail in both widescreen medieval epics and gritty social dramas in his native Czechoslovakia. This three-part series includes the masterworks *Marketa Lazoravá* and *Valley of the Bees*.

Journey to Italy

Journey to Italy (Viaggio in Italia, 1954), director Roberto Rossellini's great modernist breakthrough—often compared stylistically to James Joyce or Michelangelo Antonioni—has been restored by L'Immagine Ritrovata, Bologna, in collaboration with CSC—Cineteca Nazionale, Rome. Ingrid Bergman and George Sanders, an upper-class English couple in Naples, experience forebodings regarding their marriage.

Interpreting Shostakovich: The Film Scores

Films featuring musical scores by Russian composer Dmitri Shostakovich, including Grigori Kozintsev's *King Lear* (1971) and *Hamlet* (1964), are introduced by scholar Solomon Volkov and others. The program is presented in association with Post-Classical Ensemble.

Library of Congress Restoration

In association with the Library of Congress motion picture collections, the Gallery will feature a monthly screening of a recently restored or preserved work from their collection, one of the largest archives of moving image art in the world.

The Early Video Art of Ernie Kovacs

Hungarian-American television legend Ernie Kovacs was a discerning heir to the traditions of Dada and a forerunner of phenomena such as Monty Python. Using the medium of 1950s television as canvas for his avant-garde humor, he created hundreds of set pieces and short plays. A program exploring Kovacs as a video artist includes discussion.


