Michelangelo's David-Apollo

Through March 3 West Building, Main Floor, Gallery 11

The presentation of the David-Apollo, a marble statue by Michelangelo lent to the Gallery by the Museo Nazionale del Bargello in Florence, opens the nationwide celebration 2013 — The Year of Italian *Culture*. The graceful figure of a youth in a twisting pose is mysterious in both mood and subject; the elements that would confirm an identity as either the biblical giantkiller David or the pagan sun-god Apollo were never completed. The statue is a fascinating example of the non-finito, the unfinished condition that allows viewers to study the sculptural process in many works by Michelangelo.

Under the auspices of the President of the Italian Republic, the presentation of "Michelangelo's David-Apollo" inaugurates "2013 — The Year of Italian Culture," organized by The Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Embassy of Italy in Washington, in collaboration with the Ministero per i Beni e le Attività Culturali and with the support of the Corporate Ambassadors Intesa Sanpaolo and Eni.

The presentation of "Michelangelo's David-Apollo" has been organized by the National Gallery of Art, Washington, The Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Embassy of Italy in Washington, the Soprintendenza Speciale per il Patrimonio Storico, Artistico ed Etnoantropologico e per il Polo Museale della città di Firenze, and the Museo Nazionale del Bargello, Florence.

American townscapes are the consistent theme of Gregory Crewdson's photographic narratives that use the transformative power of light to turn banal settings into sublimely surreal scenes. This new documentary is presented in association with the Environmental Film Festival in the Nation's Capital.

The Fifth Season

The Fifth Season (La Cinquième saison, 2012) portrays the oddly erratic events occurring in a village of the Belgian Ardennes. Jessica Woodworth and Peter Brosens (Khadak, Altiplano) combine art and ethnography in films of uncommon power.


Security Check

The Collection

Masterworks by renowned European and American artists, including the only painting by Leonardo da Vinci in the Americas and the largest mobile ever created by Alexander Calder, await visitors to the National Gallery of Art, one of the world's preeminent art museums. The Gallery's collection of paintings, drawings, prints, photographs, sculptures, medals, furniture, and decorative arts traces the development of Western art from the Middle Ages to the present. The Gallery was created for the people of the United States of America by a joint resolution of Congress accepting the gift of Andrew W. Mellon in 1937.

The Gallery's campus includes the original neoclassical West Building designed by John Russell Pope, which is linked underground to the modern East Building designed by I. M. Pei, and the verdant 6.1-acre Sculpture Garden. Temporary exhibitions span the world and the history of art. The Gallery is located on the National Mall between Third and Ninth Streets NW, and along Constitution Avenue NW. Nearby Metrorail stations are located at Judiciary Square (Red Line), Archives-Navy Memorial-Penn Quarter (Yellow and Green Lines), and Smithsonian (Blue and Orange Lines). Metrobus stops are located on Fourth Street, Seventh Street, and Pennsylvania Avenue NW.
