The Coffee Cantata, No.211 - J. S. Bach

During the 17th Century, coffee had been introduced as a luxury into European Society. At first, its use was limited to the well-to-do classes, but after the Seven Years: War, it became generally popular, especially in Leipzig, where a special tax was levied in 1657 on the "undue number of Coffee Houses."

In 1776, the Landgrove of Hesse (apparently the Carrie Nation of his day) issued an edict forbidding the public or secret drinking of coffee in his dominions, which edict was in force for more than 20 years. The "Coffee Smellers" (Kaffeereicher) who lodged the information received one fourth of all fines.

In the year 1727, Picander wrote a poem, a journal in "villainous rhyme" satirizing the excessive use of coffee. A few years later, he turned his "poem" into a comic Cantata for which, in 1732, Bach composed the music.
