Tarentelle

Franz Schubert (1797-1828)

An Die Sonne (1816)

O Sun, queen of the world, you who enlighten our life in radiant majesty. Today I still see your brilliance; who knows how soon the voice of the Almighty will ring out to me: Return once more to dust!

Des Tages Weihe (1822)

Ruler of destiny, look down upon a thankful heart. Joy enlivens us again and all pain has fled away. Sorrow is forgotten; through the mists shines the infinite brilliance of your greatness.

Der Tanz (1825)

Youth talks and dreams of dances, revels and banquets; then all at once it achieves its illusory goal, and we hear it sighing and complaining, "Give me back my health, just this once!"

Gott Der Weltsschöpfer

Fly up to God, high above the planets! Rejoice in him, the Eternal, my far-resounding hymn. Praise to his wise power in heaven and on earth.

W. A. MOZART (1756-91)

Terzett: "Das Bandel" (1783)

Mozart describes the search for his wife's ribbon, an incident involving himself, his wife Konstanze, and their Viennese friend Gottfried von Joachin.

An Chloe (1787)

The young man extols the charms of the fair Chloe and longs to hold her and kiss her lovely cheeks. When he is near her, his senses are dazzled and he is lost in rapture and delight.

Milagner òtacendo (1783)

Alone and quiet, I bemoan the harshness of my fate. But do not expect, my dearest, that I shall stop loving you. Can't you understand that my heart will sigh forever only for you.

Als Luise die Briefe (1787)

A young woman throws the love-songs from her sweetheart into the fire, having discovered she is not the only recipient of his passions. But alas, she sighs, his memory will burn long afterward in her heart.

Lieber Freistadtler (Canon) (1787)

Original text by Mozart. Friends meet and ask where each is going, calling one another by mock-Masonic names such as "Gaulimauli" (horse's mouth) or "Stachelschwein" (porcupine).

JOHANNES BRAHMS (1833-97)

Der Gang zum Liebchen (1864)

I am pining to go to my sweetheart, for she is not faring well. Tend to her, cooing doves, so that she is not taken from me.

Liebe Schwalbe Dear swallow, fly to my loved one's house and say that my heart is broken by this separation.

Himmel strahlt so helle und klar

Your eyes shine brighter than the heavens; your song is sweeter than the birds; your kiss warmer than the sun. My happiness sings your praise.

Wechsellied zum Tanze (1864)

The Indifferent Ones: Come dance with me, fair one; though I don't love you, we can dance just the same.

The Tender Ones: Let them dance. We will go walking and Cupid will soon avenge us.

Neckereien~(1864)

My darling, I will have you for a bride. Won't you have me too? I would not have you for a single day! If I were a dove, I'd fly out of your sight. But I have a musket that can shoot that dove. I will have you for my bride!

The Rossini quartets are taken from a large body of miscellaneous works which Rossini informally called "Sins of my Old Age".

La Notte del Santo Natale
