In commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of Arthur Rubinstein, the brilliant young American pianist Gregory Allen presents a unique and exciting series of performances featuring the many piano works which were written for and dedicated to the great Polish maestro.

Officially endorsed as part of the Arthur Rubinstein International Music Society's Centennial celebration, this project provides a fresh and fascinating view of the legacy of one of the 20th Century's most remarkable musicians. The many facets of his musical personality — the humanistic warmth and sincerity, the wit, the passionate love of life and music are reflected in works by Stravinsky, Prokofiev, Poulenc, Milhaud, DeFalla, Villa-Lobos, and Szymanowski, among others.

GREGORY ALLEN, winner of the 1980 Rubinstein Competition in Tel Aviv, was born in Cheyenne, Wyoming in 1949. He studied at the Oberlin Conservatory, Peabody Institute, and Music Academy of the West, and has won top prizes in the Young Musicians Foundation, Gina Bachauer, Washington International, and the prestigious Queen Elisabeth Competitions. He has appeared as soloist with the Israel Philharmonic, the New York Philharmonic, as well as the orchestras of Los Angeles, San Francisco, San Diego, Baltimore, Houston, and San Antonio. He made his New York recital debut in 1978, under the sponsorship of the Pro Musicis Foundation, and has also been heard at the Kennedy Center, Ambassador Auditorium in Pasadena, and Chicago's Orchestra Hall. Mr. Allen is currently a professor of music and Artist-in-Residence at the University of Texas at Austin.
