The CARNEGIE-MELLON UNIVERSITY TRIO was formed through a happy coincidence in Maine during the Christmas holiday season of 1982, when the three musicians sat down for a leisurely afternoon of chamber music for the very first time. The rapport was instantaneous, Two days and four rehearsals later, the Trio gave its first public performance with a Beethoven program at Hancock Point, Maine.

Violinist Werner Torkanowsky, protégé of Pierre Monteux, was Music Director and Chief Conductor of the New Orleans Philharmonic for fourteen years. He has conducted the New York Philharmonic and the symphony orchestras of Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia, Detroit and Los Angeles, as well as many of the European orchestras.

Cellist George Sopkin was a pupil of Emmanuel Feuerman. He toured Europe and the United States annually as a founding member of the Fine Arts Quartet, and has recorded virtually all of the standard string quartet literature. Vox, Everest Decca and Columbia Records have all recorded him.

Pianist Harry Franklin studied at the Juilliard Graduate School with Alexander Siloti, renowned student of Franz Liszt. He has performed widely with the Musica Viva Trio and other chamber music groups. He was Head of the Department of Music at Carnegie-Mellon University from 1980-85, and has recorded for Capitol, Turnabout and Serenus records.

In 1985, the Trio made its first European tour, which included concerts at the South Bank in London and the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam. The 1986-87 season includes concerts in Pittsburgh, Chicago, Interlochen and Spain, as well as tonight's concert.

All three members of the Trio are Artists-in-Residence of the Carnegie-Mellon University and members of the Music Department Faculty.
