New York-born pianist THEODORE EDEL performs widely as a soloist and since 1980 has been Artist-in-Residence at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He holds Bachelor's and Master's Degrees from the Juilliard School and earned his Doctorate at the Manhattan School of Music. His teachers included Jacob Lateiner, Arminda Canteros and Constance Keene. Edel has played in London's Wigmore Hall and toured Italy on a U.S. Fulbright grant. After his recital in the Phillips Collection, the Washington Post headlined his "Impressive D.C. Debut", calling him a "splendid lyricist". After his most recent Carnegie Recital Hall concert, the New York Times' critic wrote of his "heroic technique . . . His interpretations were passionate, yet tempered by intellect." Last season, he was a featured concerto soloist with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. The National Gallery is pleased to welcome him back to Washington.
