A native of Washington, D.C., ALAN DI CENZO began his musical studies at age seven and won his first musical award at eleven, competing against 2,000 young artists to become the youngest person ever to win a Virginia State Competition. Subsequently, he was a scholarship student at the Peabody Conservatory, where his teacher was Miecyslaw Munz, and at Case Western Reserve University. As a Rhodes Scholar, Mr. Di Cenzo studied in Paris, both at the Conservatorie and at the Sorbonne. In 1973, he was the only American prize winner in the Alessandro Casagrande International Piano Competition at Terni, Italy, taking Second Prize. He continues to enjoy great success as a performer, both in the U.S. and abroad.
