These Concerts are broadcast live by Radio Station WGMS 570 AM and 103.5 FM.

Today, November 1, 1987, is the opening day of a major exhibit at the National Gallery of the paintings and drawings of GEORGIA O'KEEFFE. By her own accounting, music played an important role in the life of this great artist. She often worked to music, which she played on her phonograph. Her favored composers, as attested to by the presence of numerous recordings of their works in her collection, were Monteverdi and Bach. In honor of this exhibition and of O'Keeffe herself, the Gallery Orchestra has chosen from its repertiore the selections which make up the first portion of tonight's program.

The concert begins with the *Ballo*, or primary dance, from Claudio Monteverdi's opera, "Il ballo delle ingrate".

Bach composed four suites for his court orchestra while he was *Kapell-meister* to the Prince of Anhalt-Cöthen (1717-1723), as well as numerous orchestral works in other forms. The D Major Suite contains what is by far the most widely-known piece of music from all of the suites, namely the Air, which became known after Bach's time as the "Air on the G String".

Although better known as a composer of opera and overtures, Carl Maria von Weber was well able to turn his hand to writing a symphony, which he did twice. Perhaps influenced by the great Beethoven, who had composed his first symphony in the key of C major seven years before, von Weber chose that key for his own first symphony. The movement titles are an accurate indication of the vigorous and dramatic approach which von Weber brought to this form.
