GEORGE MARSH, winner of the 1985 J.S. Bach International Competitions, studied with Ivan Galamian in New York, with Paul Makanowitzky at the University of Michigan, and with Millard Taylor at the Chautauqua Institute Summer Festival. Mr. Marsh has presented recitals in Washington, Detroit, Pittsburgh and San Juan, Puerto Rico, as well as in West Berlin, where he made his European debut in 1986. A member of the first violin section of the National Symphony, he has also appeared with that orchestra as soloist under the baton of Mstislav Rostropovich. An active chamber musician, Mr Marsh is a member of the Washington Chamber Society and the Vaener String Trio, and has worked with the American String Quartet and the Guarneri Quartet.

MARGARET OTWELL is well known for her interpretations of French music, especially the music of Déodat de Séverac. Ms. Otwell was a Kade International Fellow in France in 1979, where she studied piano with Madame Gaby Casadesus. She is a graduate of the University of Maryland, where her principal teachers were Stewart Gordon and Thomas Schumacher. As a chamber musician, Ms. Otwell performs often with the Washington Chamber Society, of which she is the co-founder. In addition to concerts in Washington and other East Coast cities, she has played in Puerto Rico and France. Ms. Otwell's recording of the complete piano works of Séverac will be released in December by the Musical Heritage Society.
