Canadian mezzo-soprano CATHERINE ROBBIN has established her reputation as a talented and dedicated artist not only through her performances in oratorio, opera and recital, but also through having won several international competitions. Her successes have included top honors in the Geneva and Paris Vocal Competitions, and the Gold Award at the International Benson and Hedges Competition in Great Britain. Regarded as one of today's foremost interpreters of Baroque music, Miss Robbin has collaborated with early music specialists Alan Curtis, Christopher Hogwood and Trevor Pinnock. Her accomplishments span well beyond the bounds of early music; the range of styles presented in tonight's recital attests to her interest in Romantic as well as contemporary literature.

Among Miss Robbin's recent engagements in the United States have been the New England Bach Festival, New York's Musica Sacra and solo appearances with orchestras in Milwaukee and Chicago's Grant Park Concerts. Her solo recording for Marquis Records won a Juno Award in 1984. Scheduled for upcoming release are recordings of Scarlatti's Salve Regina and Handel's Lucretia, with the Thirteen Strings of Ottawa, and Beethoven's Ninth Symphony under the direction of Christoper Hogwood.

Pianist WILLIAM HICKS is one of today's most sought after accompanists. In addition to accompanying Miss Robbin, he has worked with Kiri Te Kanawa, Teresa Stratas, Donald Gramm and Roberta Peters. Active as a vocal coach and conductor, Mr. Hicks has been an assistant conductor with the New York City Opera and the opera companies of Fort Worth and Cincinnati. Currently, he coaches members of the Canadian Opera Company Ensemble. He has collaborated with John McGlinn in a number of important American musical theater productions, including the Jerome Kern Festival at Carnegie Hall and the American Musical Theater Series at the Library of Congress.
