RAFAEL FIGUEROA was born March 27, 1961, in the city of Santurce, Puerto Rico. Now 27, he has accumulated a number of distinguished national and international awards. As 1986-87 winner of the New England Conservatory Piatagorsky Artist Fellowship, he received not only a residency at the conservatory, but solo recital engagements in Boston and here in Washington at the Library of Congress. As co-winner of the Jill Sackler Concerto Competition at the 1986 American Cello Congress, he was invited to perform at the Kennedy Center's Terrace Theatre, where he received enthusiastic public and critical acclaim. His other prizes have included the Bronze Medal at the 1985 Casals Competition, the Gina Bachauer Award at the J. S. Bach International Competitions and the 1984 Dvořak Competition of Indiana University.

An accomplished chamber musician, Rafael Figueroa is the youngest member of the world-famous Figueroa Quintet, which has been designated the official quintet of Puerto Rico by the territorial government. The quintet's members, all from the same prominent musical family, have individually and collectively carried on a strong tradition of fine music in Puerto Rico for generations, highlighted by appearances at the renowned Casals Festival. Young Rafael began violin studies with his father, Kachiro Figueroa, at the age of five, and at eight turned to cello studies with his uncle, after whom he is named. He was also a pupil of Joaquin Vidaechea in Puerto Rico and Gary Hoffman and Janos Starker at the University of Indiana.

Pianist WU HAN began her musical studies at the age of nine. Within a few short years she gave her first solo recital and was twice awarded First Prize in the prestigious National Competition in Taipei. While still a student, she appeared frequently with major orchestras in her native Taiwan and was regularly called upon to perform with visiting artists, including Jean-Pierre Rampal and Eugene Fodor. In 1981 Ms. Han came to the United States to continue her studies at the Hartt School of Music, where her teachers were Lillian Kallir, Menahem Pressler, Rudolf Serkin and Raymond Hanson. She has performed at the Marlboro, Aspen and Caramoor Festivals and has appeared throughout the United States, both as soloist and as guest artist with the Emerson String Quartet, the Lark Quartet, the Orpheus Chamber Orchestra and the St. Luke's Chamber Ensemble.
