frequently on television, with the list of programs including "Live from Lincoln Center," "Christmas Jazz Special," and ABC's "20/20." Mr. Wadsworth is also a familiar figure at the White House, having performed for Presidents Kennedy, Nixon, Ford, Carter, and Reagan. A native of Newnan, Georgia, Charles Wadsworth recently received an honor especially meaningful to a native son when he was appointed artistic director of the 1996 Cultural Olympiad in Atlanta.

Coloratura soprano BEVERLY HOCH has achieved worldwide renown for the range and expressivity of her voice. Performing throughout Europe, Ms. Hoch has gained particular recognition for her performance of such roles as Blondchen Mozart's Abduction from the Seraglio, Olympia in Offenbach's Tales of Hoffman, and Zerbinetta in Richard Strauss' Ariadne auf Naxos. Meanwhile here in the United States she has excited audiences with her portrayals of Gilda in Rigoletto, Rosina in The Barber of Seville, and the title role in Delibes' Lakmé. An active chamber musician and recitalist, Miss Hoch has sung at both Spoleto Festivals (Charleston, South Carolina, and Spoleto, Italy,) at the Carmel, California, Bach Festival, and with the Newport Chamber Music Festival Artists.

Clarinetist TODD PALMER won the 1990 Young Concert Artists International Auditions, the YCA's Paul Fish Memorial Prize, and the Aaron and Irene Diamond Soloist Prize in 1993. He has appeared as soloist with orchestras all over the United States, including the New York Chamber Symphony, the Houston Symphony, the Cincinnati Chamber Orchestra, and the Maryland Symphony under Barry Tuckwell. His chamber music credits include numerous concerts at the Spoleto Festival (USA) and with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and Musicians from Marlboro. He has been the clarinetist of choice for performances of Schubert's *Shepherd on the Rock* by sopranos Kathleen Battle, Roberta Peters, Renée Fleming, and Dawn Upshaw. Mr. Palmer's first CD of works for clarinet and piano has been released on the Koch International Classics label.

Pianist CHARLES WADSWORTH is a familiar figure at the National Gallery, having performed here seven times since 1959. He has been credited by the *New York Times* as being "the man behind the chamber music boom," due in no small part to his tireless activity as founder and director of the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, which he headed from 1969 to 1989. In addition to his many live performances, he appears
