Since its founding in 1984, the WASHINGTON MEN'S CAMERATA has worked to perform, promote, and preserve the vital musical legacy of music for men's voices. The fifty-plus voices of the all-volunteer Camerata consistently prove that singing can be a challenging, rewarding, and lifelong activity regardless of one's chosen profession. Recent appearances include concerts at the Kennedy Center, the Smithsonian Institution, the Washington National Cathedral, the Embassy of the Russian Federation, and the White House. The Ensemble's 1993 CD on the Gothic label, *Masters in this Hall: Christmas Music for Men's Chorus* has enjoyed critical acclaim.

THOMAS BEVERIDGE has conducted the Washington Men's Camerata since 1988. He studied composition at Harvard University with Walter Piston and Randall Thompson, and in France with the legendary Nadia Boulanger. An accomplished soloist and composer, Mr. Beveridge served as a bass soloist and staff arranger/composer with the U.S. Army Chorus for twenty years and has performed in recital and as oratorio soloist throughout the U.S. and Europe. He directs the New Dominion Chorale in Virginia, heads the adult choral program and teaches voice at the Levine School of Music, and is adjunct professor of voice at George Mason University.

Pianist EDWARD NEWMAN is a graduate of the Juilliard School where he studied with such distinguished artists as Rosina Lhevinne, Adele Marcus, Lee Luvisi, and Gaby Casadesus. Among his many honors are First Prize in the Robert Casadesus and semifinalist in the Van Cliburn International Piano Competitions. His numerous recital and orchestral performances have received critical acclaim throughout Europe. Mr. Newman serves on the faculties of George Mason University and the Levine School of Music.

Concerts from the National Gallery are broadcast in their entirety at 7:00 p.m. on Sundays on radio station WGTS, 91.9 FM, four weeks after the live performance. The use of cameras or recording equipment during the performance is not allowed.

For the convenience of concertgoers the Garden Café remains open until 6:30 p.m.
