The Musicians

Since the enthusiastic public reception of its first concert in 1995, the National Gallery of Art Wind Ensemble has become a regular feature of the Gallery's popular Sunday concert series. Founded by former National Gallery of Art music director George Manos, the ensemble explores and presents masterpieces of chamber music that are rarely heard as well as the standard classics for wind ensemble. In 2007 the group was a featured resident ensemble at the Amalfi Coast Music Festival in Vietri sul Mare, Italy, and in 2012 it represented the Gallery in an exchange of resident ensembles with the Phillips Collection. In 2013 the ensemble performed nineteenth-century French repertoire for winds in honor of the exhibition *Color, Line, and Light: French Drawings, Watercolors, and Pastels from Delacroix to Signac*.

In honor of the exhibition Andrew Wyeth: Looking Out, Looking In, today's concert includes works by two of the artist's favorite composers, Bach and Beethoven. Wyeth also had a passion for music by Rachmaninoff and Sibelius, and professed a fondness for the modernists Stravinsky and Alban Berg. He once described the difference between oil paint and egg tempera as "like the difference between Beethoven and Bach." The exhibition remains on view in the West Building until November 30, 2014.
