#### **National Gallery of Art Vocal Ensemble**

The National Gallery of Art Vocal Ensemble was formed more than ten years ago to perform concerts in connection with Gallery exhibitions, including seventeenth-century Dutch music in honor of Jan Lievens: A Dutch Master Rediscovered (2008) and Pride of Place: Dutch Cityscapes of the Golden Age (2009), as well as music by Vivaldi and other Italian composers to celebrate the opening of Venice: Canaletto and His Rivals (2011). In 2010, members of the ensemble joined forces with the early music ensemble ARTEK to perform Claudio Monteverdi's Vespers for the Blessed Virgin (1610) on the occasion of its 400th anniversary year, and in 2012 and 2013, the group sang the Gallery's traditional Viennese New Year concert.

# **Exhibition Information**

Power and Pathos: Bronze Sculptures of the Hellenistic Age presents more than fifty bronze sculptures and related works, dating from the fourth century BC to the first century AD. These artifacts span the Hellenistic period when the art and culture of Greece spread throughout the Mediterranean and lands once conquered by Alexander the Great. Through the medium of bronze, artists were able to capture the dynamic realism, expression, and detail that characterize the new artistic goals of the era. This exhibition features works from renowned archaeological museums in Austria, Denmark, France, Georgia, Great Britain, Greece, Italy, Spain, Tunisia, the United States, and the Vatican. As few ancient bronzes survive — most were melted down over the centuries — this exhibition offers an unprecedented opportunity to appreciate the importance of bronze in antiquity and the innovations of Hellenistic sculptors.
