

#### The Musician

Edvinas Minkstimas is regarded as one of Europe's top emerging young pianists, whose extensive repertory, solid technique, and musical expression have led him to perform throughout Europe and the Americas. A native of Kaunas, Lithuania, Minkstimas claims his early artistic influences from Nordic poetry, Baltic mythology, and other romantic images. He conveys the lyricism and poetry within a musical work through his display of virtuoso technique and is strongly influenced by such great pianists as Sviatoslav Richter and Arturo Benedetti Michelangeli, and the composers Brahms, Liszt, Rachmaninoff, Ravel, Ligeti, and Penderecki.

Minkstimas gave his professional debut at age fourteen with the Lithuanian National Philharmonic Orchestra. After studying at the Lithuanian Academy of Music with Veronika Vitaite, he received the artist diploma from the Paris Conservatory under the tutelage of Michel Béroff. He was awarded his doctorate degree from the Juilliard School, where he was granted the C. V. Starr Foundation Doctoral Fellowship and studied with Jerome Lowenthal.

Minkstimas won the 2010 Belz-Parker Young Artist Award and first prize at Lithuania's Fifth International Čiurlionis Piano Competition, and earned top honors at the First Tchaikovsky International Competition for Young Musicians (Moscow), the International Knezkova-Hussey International Piano Competition (Canada), and European Piano Days (France). He has received numerous grants and scholarships, including those from the Meyer Foundation (France), the Music Academy of the West (California), and the Lithuanian Ministry of Culture. He has performed in solo appearances with numerous orchestras, including the National Symphony, Arlington Philharmonic, Fairfax Symphony, Mahler Philharmoniker, Lithuanian National Philharmonic, and Amadeus, and at the National Gallery of Art and Weill Recital Hall, and on concert tours in Europe and South America.

In 2011, Minkstimas became Artist-in-Residence of the Embassy Series Festival in Washington, DC, and collaborated with Jerome Barry on Songs of Vilna Ghetto, a program that has toured Europe and the United States and featured Minkstimas's arrangements. He has served as a jury and board member of the Salzburg Vocal Festival and on the board of Vienna's Mahler Philharmoniker. He has been a guest faculty member of the Washington International Piano Festival and is a co-founder of Global Lithuanian Leaders.

Minkstimas is a Steinway Artist and has released two recordings, featuring solo and orchestral performances of works by Brahms, Beethoven, and Liszt.
