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

The Musicians

John Kilkenny enjoys a unique career in the music world as a performer, educator, and conductor. Hailed as a "particularly fine timpanist" by the *Washington Post*, Kilkenny's active performance schedule in the 2016 – 2017 season includes performances of Michael Daugherty's *Raise the Roof* concerto for timpani and wind ensemble, as well as solo and duet recitals, master classes, orchestral performances, and guest conducting engagements. In 2014, Kilkenny participated in the Washington, DC, premiere of John Luther Adams's large-scale work, *Sila: Breath of the World*, with the United States Air Force Band. Throughout his career, Kilkenny has had the privilege to perform with a range of ensembles, including the National Symphony Orchestra, the Washington National Opera and Ballet, Wolf Trap Park for the Performing Arts, and others. Recent commissions and premieres include works by Alejandro Viñao, duets for keyboard and percussion by Nathan Daughtrey and Brett Dietz, and ensemble works by Stephen Gorbos, Victor Provost, and Nico Muhly. Kilkenny has shared the stage with many artists, including Robert van Sice, John Tafoya, Jonathan Haas, and Eric Huebner.

A committed educator, Kilkenny is director of percussion studies and assistant director of concert bands at George Mason University. Under his leadership, Mason Percussion has become the leading university percussion program in the state of Virginia and a destination school for serious study of classical percussion. In 2011, Kilkenny founded the Mason Percussion Group, an elite, audition-based ensemble committed to commissioning and performing major works for percussion chamber music.

Kilkenny studied conducting with Anthony Maiello and began early percussion training with Jonathan Haas and William Richards. He went on to receive his bachelor's degree at the Juilliard School under the tutelage of Greg Zuber and Daniel Druckman. He completed a master's degree at Temple University, where he studied with legendary percussionist Alan Abel.

Tobias Werner was the cellist in residence and co-artistic director at Garth Newel Music Center from 1999 to 2012. He is the music director at the Chamber Music Conference of the East, artistic director of Pressenda Chamber Players, and teaching artist for Arts for the Aging. He has performed at Carnegie Hall, Villa Musica Mainz, the San Diego Chamber Music Workshop, the Maui Classical Music Festival, the Phillips Collection, and Bargemusic. Werner has appeared as soloist with orchestras in the United States, France, Germany, and Romania, and his recent performances have included the concertos of Dvořák, Elgar, Haydn, and Boccherini. He has recorded on the ECM, Dabringhaus and Grimm, Bayer Records, and Orfeo labels. Recent CD releases include Piano Quartets by Mozart, Brahms, Dvořák, and Martinû with the Garth Newel Piano Quartet, the Suites for Unaccompanied Cello by J. S. Bach, and the Sonatas for Piano and Cello by Beethoven with Victor Asuncion. Werner studied at the Musikhochschule Freiburg in Germany and at Boston University. His teachers have included Andrés Díaz, Christoph Henkel, and Xavier Gagnepain. He plays on an 1844 J. F. Pressenda cello.
